**Negro Boxers Have Proved
Serious Threats Since 1791**

English Heavyweight, Known as "The Black," Knocked Out the Great Treadway in 35 Rounds of Bruising. Molyneux Tricked Out of Heavyweight Title.

NEW YORK—As far back as 1791 the Negro has made himself felt in boxing annals.

In that early era of bare knuckle fighting, when rounds terminated when either of the principals slipped, or intentionally dropped to the ground, there was an English heavyweight fighter known as "The Black." This formidable African who waded his way through the British rowdies of the 17th century, gained lasting fame by knocking out the great Treadway in 35 rounds, of bruising mauling. Bill Richmond, a slave born on Staten Island, bobbed up in England, the cradle of early prizefighting around 1805-10. While slightly above the middleweight poundage, Richmond fought the great Tom Cribb and gave him "merry Ned" while it lasted.

Tom Molyneux, Not Jack Johnson, Was First Colored Heavyweight Challenger.

Tom Molyneux, a Virginian of heroic build, was the greatest of early

Negro fighters. Tom Fletcher, early English biographer of fighting men, refers to Molyneux or Molineux, as a Virginia slave. The record is not clear on whether he was slave or freeborn—no one seriously questions his fighting ability, however. In 1810 the giant Blackamoor fought Cribb.

Molyneux Was Tricked

Jack Johnson was a champion of the world; Jackson was champion of Great Britain, and Tom Molyneux would have been a champion had he received common justice in his first battle with Tom Cribb fought on December 10, 1810 at Cophall Commons—in a drenching downpour.

"Eagan," in his account of the mercurial affray in Bociana, says nothing about the trick through which Molyneux was robbed of victory and a title. But in a later article referring to the powerful Negro's death at Galway, Ireland, Eagan writes:

"His first contest with Cribb will be long remembered by the sport-

ing world. It will also not be forgotten if justice hold the scales, that his color alone prevented him from becoming the hero of that fight."

Eagan refers to a trick on the part of Cribb's seconds at a time when the champion was virtually out in his corner in the twenty-first round and unable to come to scratch. His seconds then rushed up to Molyneux and accused him of holding bullets in his hands. Such action would have hurt the Negro more than the title holder.

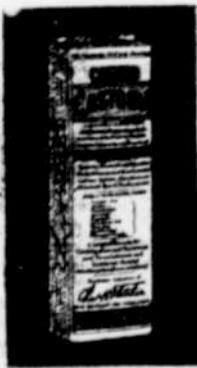
