BOOK REVIEW

"BLACK ECHO" BY Donald Grey (Pegasus Publishing Co., N. Y.)

Reviewed for THE ADVOCATE by CLIFFORD C. MITCHELL. There was considerable mystery about the parentage of Norman Clay.

Through his school activities he met one Peggy Morris, a descendant of an old aristocratic family of Savannah. Their estate included the isolated island of Killwaw, where for generations the Morris family ruled in a sovereign manner.

Clay accepts an invitation from the Morris family to spend his vacation at Killwaw. No sooner had he arrived than the mystery of his past begins to unfold.

Mammy Sukey, the colored woman who really rules the island and knows all its history, recognizes Clay and recalls the circumstances of his birth.

From this point on, the editor, Donald Gray, very subtly portrays two distinct characters in Norman Clay, and, of course, attributes all of his good points to his white blood and all of his disgusting, ridiculous and uncomplimentary traits to the Negro blood in his veins.

(Continued from page one) than jobs. They can't get work elsewhere because their certificates do not rate high enough. "That situation shows an economic loss to the state and to the graduates as well as Oregonians a jolt that must hurt their pride.

"The consolidation bill puts a teacher college at Eugene to occupy the university buildings. Offering a four-year standard course, the calibre of our own teachers will be broadened, and if we cannot give our graduates a job in Oregon they will be equipped to land one elsewhere.

NEGRO SPRINTER SETS NEW RECORD

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 1—Eddie Tolan, colored sprint star who holds a corner on the world's 100-yard record, broke two Olympic dash marks here on the 26th for the American Olympic team.

The former University of Michigan sprinter clipped three-tenths of a second from the 100-meter dash record by stopping the distance in 10.3. Returning to the track one hour later, he flashed the 200-meter sprint in 20.7.

The present Olympics mark held jointly by Hahn and Scholz of the United States and Kernig of Germany, is 21.6.

With his record-shattering performance, Tolan qualified for the Mid-Western finals in Chicago this week, where he will race George Simpson, former Ohio state dash. Simpson bettered the 200-meter mark four-tenths of a second in the trials at Cincinnati.
