WHITE COMPANIES WONT SELL ICE TO NEGRO

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. (CNS)—Hillard Curtis, colored retail dealer in ice, last week filed suit for \$15,000 against 14 white wholesale ice dealers for boycotting him and refusing to sell him ice. In his complaint, Curtis alleges that the defendants conspired to refuse to sell him ice as long as he continued to retail it in the North Side, an exclusive white section of the city. He asks for damages and an injunction from further interference with his right to do business in this section. Color prejudice is believed to be at the bottom of the boycott established against the successful Negro ice salesman.
