



Craw-Ho is married and has on with the exception of 18 months in the army during the World war. has practiced law continuously in Portland since 1915. He graduated from Williamette University in 1911 and from Yale University Law School in 1913. 1913-15 served as First Assistant Attorney General of Oregon. In 1930 was elected State Senator from Multhomah County, receiving both Republican and Democratic nominations. As State Senator he was the author of the non-partisan judiciary law, co-author of the free text book law and of much other progressive legislation. In August, 1931, Governor Meler appointed him Circuit Judge for Multhomah County, Dept. 2 succeeding Robert G. Morrow, deceased, and he is now a candidate to succeed himself. Judge Crawford is Ex-president of the Oregon Bar association, trustee of Willamette University, active in affaire of the American Legion and o member of the Episcopal Church.
