ANDERSON SEEKS LONG AND SHORT TERM

From all sections of Portland come reports that voters are rallying to the support of Gust Anderson, candidate for city commissioner.

Mr. Anderson is running for both the short and long term for city commissioner on the same principles of social justice and public welfare.

He also favors unemployment relief to whatever extent is necessary to relieve suffering and distress among unemployed; the development of home industries and the use of Oregon products and local labor in all public works.

Mr. Anderson is strongly in favor of reduced telephone rates and has some record for telephone franchise for a term not more than five years.

Mr. Anderson is well qualified for the post of city commissioner. Elected to the state legislature first in 1928, he made such a splendid record that he was re-elected two years later by the second largest vote given legislative candidates in Multnomah County.

RUNS FOR MAYOR VACANCY

Candidates who fail to take a definite stand on public issues and to offer a specific program for tax relief benefit both the intelligence and power of Portland's people, declares Joseph K. Carson, Jr., an outstanding contender in the mayoralty race.

"The issue today is the cost of government and the public debt," Carson emphasized. "It is my issue and it is the public's issue. It is the issue of

every property owner and every homeowner, of the men and women fighting to lift the burden of taxes which threatens to smother them.

"It is an issue that is not going to end on election day but will continue until a mayor takes office who, working with the great mass of our citizenry, will eliminate the frills and duplications in our city government, the costly non-essentials and wasteful methods.

Carson declared that the statements and press utterances of several of his opponents amaze him.

"It appears that they think only five men in our city—the mayor and commissioners—can do anything for Portland," he said.

"It isn't true. Portland has 310,000 determined people who can, and are going to, get results. True, they can get results faster and with less cost and effort, if they elect a mayor who will cooperate with them and who recognizes they have the judgement and strength to demand their own tax protection.

"A candidate without a definite program will be lost if elected; a candidate who straddles loses if he wins. If given an opportunity to serve as mayor, we can give this city a thorough overhauling, secure discipline and efficiency, wipe out our deficit and restore confidence.

"With the counsel and advice of Portlanders who care we can march forward to a new day in city government, and the candidate who says we cannot, insults the thought; ability and ultimate authority of our voters.

"I say we can and will carry out this program of economy.

Citizens who vote for Carson will be voting for saving of approximately \$750,000 which he specifically proposes. They will be voting for proper regulation of utilities and for franchises that bring actual benefits to the consumer.

They will be voting for fewer tax dollars and for a full dollar in service value for each tax dollar put in the treasury. They will be voting for a greater voice in city government, and a partnership in municipal affairs with a mayor who recognizes their intelligence, their sense of civic duty, and their strength.

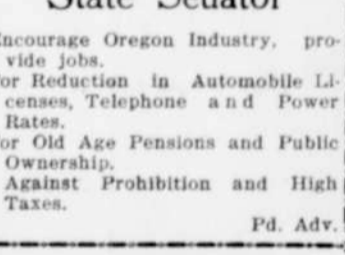
Mr. Johansson has long been known as the friend of the colored people. He lived in Chicago at the time of the race riots and was one of the staunchest defenders of the Negroes.

States His Platform

"At this time of financial disruption, of economic chaos, one supreme task confronts the Nation, one sustained, superlative effort is demanded and must be put forth." This colossal task is that of finding the way to bring about an adequate, just, and practicable adjustment of the differences between production and consumption, throughout the country; or, in other words, find a solution to the problem of distribution.

"This is the heart of the difficulty; and unless, or until this shall have been accomplished, all our remedies will fail. The life of the Nation is but an extension of the life of the citizen; if we in Portland, can solve our part of the problem, we will have performed a national service.

"The oft quoted saying of Abraham Lincoln, 'The Lord must have loved common people,' has not lost its force because the common people are both producers and consumers, and if their needs are not supplied, the country must perish.

"During the past ten years, taxes in Multnomah County have increased over 55 per cent and the net outstanding debt has increased 119 per cent. Telephone rates are excessive and street car fares so high that only a few people travel by that method. These rates and fares should be drastically reduced. It is contended that the companies must maintain present rates, or retire from these enterprises, then the sooner this retirement occurs, the better for the people of the city. Natural resources of the country and all other enterprises affecting the public interest belong to all the people and the public interest should be made universal. It now appears that thousands of citizens of Portland and of the State of Oregon have suffered financial loss through recent transactions in the sale or transfer of the securities of public utilities corporations. It is suggested that the courts have been called upon to determine the validity of these transactions. I think that the City Commissioners of the City of Portland should, so far as may be in their power, cooperate with various interested groups in an effort to secure for the Oregon State Public Utilities Commissioner the power of supervision over future sales or transfer of such securities.

"I favor the adoption by the voters at the coming election, of the amendment of the Oregon constitution, that provides the means whereby government owned and controlled hydro electric power can be developed in Oregon. I favor the commencement, as soon as possible, of active operations in the construction of power dams in the Columbia River. The federal and state governments should settle upon a plan of operations, in order that men and women of Oregon may soon be employed, and Oregon materials and fabricated articles may be used in this important constructive work. This would reduce unemployment in this state and release large amounts of money into circulation.

"I favor the adoption, by the city of some plan that shall adequately regulate and control the gambling fraternity and its resorts. The present law is archaic, its administration is a burden upon the city, and the condition is to wreck the lives and the homes of all these who patronize the gamblers. It has been charged, and not denied, that the present city administration favors keeping the gambling places open, notwithstanding that the law prohibits the existence of such places. No part of the admittedly great income from these places now reaches the city treasury.

"I heartily endorse the able and economical administration of state affairs by Governor Julius L. Meier, and, if I am elected, I will strive for reductions in the city expenses, at the same time maintaining efficient service.

"I have lived in Portland 33 years. I have at all times taken a keen interest in civic affairs and felt a desire to promote the well being of all people. I have never before sought public office and do so now only because I hope I can be of service to the city that has done so much for me.

"I believe these are a great constructive force, for the good of man, in the Golden Rule; and if elected to the office of City Commissioner, I promise to be guided by the principle therein enunciated.

VIRGINIAN REMEMBERS HAPPY TIME IN PORTLAND

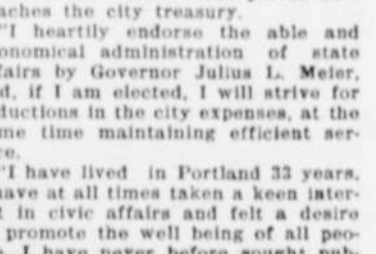
