BOOK REVIEW

"RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED"

By Arnold G. Aron (Georgia Press — East River, Conn.)

More than any volume on Economics that I have yet received, "Respectfully Submitted," written by an internationally recognized successful New York Attorney, describes and analyzes our present day economic ailments.

This book, undoubtedly, was written between November 1931 and February, 1932, and in light of certain happenings during the year 1932, particularly the various propagandized panaceas that were so widely spread during the recent political campaign, makes the reader reflect and give additional credence to the theories of Mr. Aron.

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 1.—Did you know the five greatest centers of Negro population in the United States are all north of the Mason and Dixon line? Did you know that in the last ten years the increase of Negro population at the North was several times as great in actual numbers as in the South, and many times as great in percentage of gain?

These facts and many more relative to Negro welfare are found in a booklet just issued by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation, entitled "Recent Trends in Race Relations." While setting out at some length the encouraging gains which have been made in this field, including court justice, the decrease of mob violence and the increase of cooperative relationships between the races, the survey presents also the darker sides of the picture, such as inadequate health facilities, educational inequalities, economic exploitation, decided economic losses of late, and the prevalence still of a vast amount of misunderstanding and potential hostility at the

level of "the mass mind." As its title indicates, the booklet presents in condensed form a comprehensive survey of the more important conditions and trends affecting Negroes, particularly in the south. Several pages are then devoted to a look at the various activities carried on by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation and its affiliated state and local committees. This commission is headed by Dr. John Hope, president of Atlanta University, and has a membership of 116 outstanding men and women of both races, representing thirteen Southern States. The Commission, it is stated, will mail a copy of "Recent Trends" to any one sending four cents in stamps. Its headquarters are at 703 Standard Building, Atlanta, Ga.

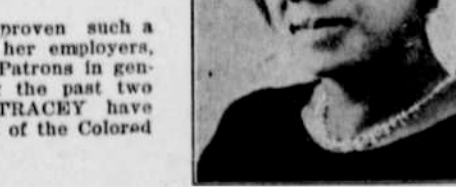
