Theoretically, Negroes have every civil right in the state of Oregon that any other citizen has. But in practice he has not.

CHEESE TO THE RESCUE
For sparkle and zest in any meal cheese is the answer. Cheese, because it has so many interesting relatives-som with a nippy twang and others with a subtle flavor, comes to the rescue when menu planning becomes a problem.

Cottage Cheese Ring
Cottage Cheese Ring with Fruit Filled Center
1 tablespoon gelatine, 1/4 cup cold water, 2 cups cottage cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 cup milk, 2 cups diced fruit (dried or fresh), 1 head lettuce.

Besides lasting good, cheese has many nutritional qualities which recommend its frequent use. Cheese in the menu makes important contributions to the daily protein, calcium, phosphorus and vitamin needs of the body.

Used as the main dish, for seasoning, or as the always popular "cracker and cheese" dessert, cheese always meets with favor with every member of the family.

The following receipts are sure to please:

Cheese Noodle Ring
1/4 cup of melted butter, 3 eggs (separated), 2 cups cooked noodles.

Stir the butter into the freshly cooked noodles. Add the well beaten egg yolks, and fold in the whites, beaten stiff. Pour into a ring, set in a pan of water, and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg.) for 20 minutes, or until a knife thrust into it will come out clean.

Cheese Sauce
2 cups milk, 4 tablespoons flour, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon

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
