NORTH CAROLINA OFFERS TO PAY

AS RESULT OF FIGHT TO ENTER STATE SCHOOLS TUITION NEGRO STUDENTS IN OTHER SCHOOLS

Raleigh N. C., April 20—As a direct result of the fight being made by Negroes for admission to the University of North Carolina professional schools, a bill has been introduced in the state legislature here and approved by the judiciary committee which provides for the payment by the state of the expenses of Negro students at professional colleges "where they may be lawfully admitted," which means of course, in some northern states.

The proposed bill would make any Negro who could show a certificate of admission from any grade school and could lawfully enter eligible for the allotment of state funds.

MEASURE PUTS TEETH IN PRESENT LAW

IMPOSES FINE OR JAIL TERM FOR DISCRIMINATION

Hartford, Conn., April 24—The Civil Rights Bill, which Negroes and influential whites in Connecticut have been advocating for more than twenty years was favorably reported to the State Senate last Thursday by the Judiciary Committee.

PAUL ROBESON INCIDENT

Friday, March 24th, Negroes from all over Connecticut and their white friends assembled in the Old Senate Chamber and pleaded with the Committee to protect the rights of all Connecticut citizens.

Other organizations who enlisted their aid were the Hartford N. A. A. C. P. and the Church Federation which brought in its own bill which includes the fundamental provisions sought by the advocates of civil rights in the original bill.

TEXT OF BILL

The substitute bill follows: Section 1: All persons within the jurisdiction of this State shall be entitled to full and equal accommodations in every place of public accom-

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
