CONNECTICUT TO ENACT CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATION

Continued from page one modation, resort or amusement, subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all persons, and any denial of such accommodation by reason of the race creed or color of the applicant, therefore shall be a violation of the provision of this section. A place of public accommodation, resort, or amusement within the meaning of this section shall be deemed to include all inns, taverns, roadhouses, hotels, restaurants, eating houses or any place where food is sold for consumption on the premises; railroad cars and stations, street railroad cars, and stations, public service busses and ses, music halls amusement and recreation parks.

Section 2: Any person who shall violate any provision of Section One of this act shall be fined not more thant \$100 or imprisoned not more than thirty days or both.

The case of Haywood Paterson should be carried direct to the public. There should be a direct appeal to the executive head of the nation. That appeal should be made by every religious organization, every fraternal association, and in fact by all Negroes, barring none. The decision of that Alabama jury is a direct challenge to every Negro in America.
