The youths in question stated that they were just passing through Portland on their way east. "Will you go on now?" inquired the judge. "Yes," the boys chorused. "Well, go on," said his Honor.

"Remember when you are on a party line, you have to be considerate of the other party. When you find someone using the line, wait ten or fifteen minutes, give them a chance to finish their conversation before you try to get the line." Thus advised the kindly jurist to a couple of hostile neighbors who came into his court to settle a telephonic fuss, all because one called the other a "meddlesome old dead-end beat." Testimony was introduced to show that stronger and more violent epithets were hurled over the phone at the plaintiff, but other testimony offered by the other side overcame the first and the two women with their several witnesses and two babies quietly left the court room and the judge settled down to fining a few fellows who had come to his court one time too often.

"Didn't I promise you four months if you ever came back here again?" queried the judge to the sole colored defendant haled before him that morning. "Yes, honor, but I wasn't drunk. If that policeman had waited another hour, I woulder been drunk though for I had the bottle in my pocket but had n't time to drink the stuff," he concluded. "I keep my promises" said the judge. "Four months—let's see that is one hundred and twenty days, isn't it?" asked the judge.

A young woman haled before him on a drunk charge for the first time was told to go on and do no more. Just before recess, an aged, forlorn, somebody's father who couldn't remember where he lives but who claimed Portland as his home for the past twenty years but for some reason or other he hadn't "picked out a home yet" was sent to Doctor Cliff with commendation for the County farm.

The officer who made the arrest stated that the aged soul was a victim of "canned heat".

Five members of a drunken brawl—four men and one woman were fined ten dollars each.

And so it went on all during the day and so it goes all during the year. A judge must be good, kind, thoughtful, analytic, a psychologist, a sociologist. In fact he must know everything or at least a goodly portion about everything and people, so that he can pass wisely, honestly and sympathetically upon those who come before him from day to day.

PRESIDENT BARCLAY OF LIBERIA TREATS WITH MAJOR-GENERAL WINSHIP AGREE ON PROGRAM TO BBE PRESENTED AT GENEVA

Monrovia, Liberia, June 22—As a result of conferences held during the past five weeks between His Excellency the President of Liberia and Maj.-Gen. Winship, Representative of President Roosevelt on Special Mission to Liberia; substantial progress has been made towards settling on a basis of mutual accommodations of the differences between the Government of Liberia and the Finance Corp. of America. Mr. Lyle, vice-president of the Finance Corporation with offices here, has made certain offers on behalf of Firestone which includes anticipated reduction in the interest charges on the 1926 loan; provision for regularizing the status of past due interest and amortization and revision of salaries of the American fiscal agents. Should these proposals become effective, a saving of approximately fifty thousand dollars per annum for the duration of the loan is contemplated, as well as special provision for meeting revised interest charges during the period of business depression and curtailed Government revenues.

The concession offered to the Government by the Finance Corporation of America in the above respects are conditioned upon the prior agreement of the Government of Liberia to the re-establishment in full authority of the American Fiscal Officers, and the acceptance by the Government of various modifications in the Loan Agreement of 1926 destined to clarify the status of the Financial Advisory, and settle a number of questions of interpretation which have caused friction in the past.

Final agreement of the points still outstanding will be sought in Geneva, where a meeting of the International Committee on Liberia of the council of the League of Nations will be held as soon as the Liberian Representative and General Winship have reached Switzerland. The Hon. Secretary of State, Louis A. Grimes, who will be Liberia's representative and Gen. Winship and their suites left Monrovia on the S.S. Canada for Marseilles on last week. Mr. Lyles also sailed at the same time.

 educational institutions.
 At several times during the round-table discussion of the subject there were pointed colloquies between the Illinois representative and Congressman lantern of Texas.
 "Unfortunately, it is not only Howard university that is involved," stated Mr. Blanton. It is also some of the large white universities, and they ought to be cleaned up, and the American father should investigate and send his son only to institutions in the United States that do not teach Communism."

He was applauded, whereupon Mr. Depriest replied: "I am happy to say that this is one time the gentleman from Texas and I agree on something." After laughter from the House, Blanton added a bit unctuously: "I, too, am gratified immensely that I can heartily endorse the patriotic American utterances which our colleague from Illinois has used so eloquently in denouncing un-American Communism."

Praising Mr. Depriest again, he remarked: "I want to commend with all my heart the patriotic expressions, a gainst communism made by our colleague from Illinois. He demonstrated his fitness as a leader of his colored race."

On Friday night, June 30th, there will be a mass meeting at Olivet Baptist Church and the Spingarn Medal night will be at Ebenezer Baptist church and on Sunday afternoon the closing mass meeting will take place at the Savoy Ball Room.

This conference has been arranged by the National office of the Association as a "work" conference and will be free from many of the entertainment features that have in the past been part of the annual gathering of delegates and friends. The World's Fair will offer many of the pleasures that ordinarily are provided by the host to the Conference.
