BOOK REVIEW

"THE LIGHT IN THE JUNGLE"
 By Edison Marshall
 (H. C. Kinsey & Co., Inc., 105 W. 40th Street, New York City, New York)

This is another jungle story in which the primitive tribes and their peculiar superstitions are featured. The scenes are laid in Indo-China and the tribes are composed of a mixture of the Indian and Chinese races.

David Steele, the son of a white American missionary, returned to Indo-China fifteen years after his father had been slain, presumably by some of the Indian tribes to gain valuable possessions of jade that the American missionary had unearthed. It was Steele's intention to track down the slayers of his father and also to obtain possession of the stolen jade which was worth a king's ransom.

Ruth, a young American white girl, is in Indo-China with her aunt, Alice Benson, both doing missionary work among the Indians. Ruth, although possessing the beauty and of the age to be the belle of any American community has definitely forsaken all worldly pleasures in the furtherance of doing missionary work among the supposed heathens of Indo-China and at the time David Steele appears on the scene she is teaching the little village school and helping her aunt in the mission they have established.

When Steele engaged upon his duo mission, he hid his real identity and became known as Davidson, an American banker. His banking consisted of owning three gambling resorts maintained for the upper strata of American society and brought him considerable income. Ruth, however, accepts him as a conservative and respectable banker and in this David encourages her although against his will, fearing to tell her the real truth.

David and Ruth, of course, are the only young and healthy white Americans in this particular jungle land and the reader knows from the start that the greatest adventure is to be in the romance of these two. And the romance starts out in regular novel style when David captures and kills a ferocious tiger that has been a menace to the natives thereabout. This act not only makes him a hero in Ruth's eyesight but also to the natives who swear allegiance to the new white God as they call him, and to the High white Priestess as they call Ruth.

The plot is then stretched out in some two hundred pages of romance, adventure, tribal war-fare, plots and counter-plots, with many a hair-raising and exciting capture, escape and thrilling episode of life in the jungle.

The climax is more or less stereotyped and to be expected. David captures the slayer of his father who was none other than a renegade Frenchman, the valuable jade once owned by his father becomes his possession, and, of course, Ruth learns everything about David, forgives him and together - and as one - they sail away for American shores.

P. E. P. CO. AND GAS COMPANY
 (Continued from last week)

Question: Is this tax imposed on the P. E. P. Co., and on the Gas Co?

Answer: No. The P. E. P. Co. and the Gas Co. each pay \$300 per year.

Question: How much would these companies pay on a relative basis?

Answer: It has been estimated that the P. E. P. Co. for 1932 would have paid approximately \$135,000, and the Gas Co. approximately \$80,000. These amounts would have helped to further reduce your taxes.

Question: Why have they not paid this tax?

Answer: The franchisees of these 2 companies were given many years ago, before it was recognized as just and equitable that such a tax be imposed on Utilities. Twice within the past year an effort was made in the City Council to tax the gross earnings of these two companies but it failed of approval in the Council by a vote of 3 to 2.

POP CORN TAX

Question: Is it true that Pop Corn Wagons in the downtown districts pay a \$600 tax per year, and \$200 a year in the residential sections?

Answer: Yes. The Pop Corn Wagon in your neighborhood pays a tax equal to the franchise tax of the P. E. P. Co.

A DOUBLE PROBLEM IN WEIGHT CONTROL

Summer effects people differently when it comes to the question of weight. Because some are less active in the summer months than during the cooler seasons, they will put on weight, while others begin to lose as soon as warm weather comes.

To most of those who are interested in their weight, the question of weight control becomes one of self-control, and exercising the intelligence will be the most effective way to lose the surplus pounds or to gain them as the case may be. Without altering the usual meals served to the family, it is possible to curtail or increase the caloric intake of the individual members.

If so person lives a well-regulated life and eats a diet adequate in every other essential except calories, weight reduction can be accomplished with no injury to health. The important point to remember in any diet, whether it be a reducing, a normal, or a building up one, is that each day it contain the following essentials: Milk, a quart for children and at least a pint for adults; at least two servings of vegetables, one green or yellow; two servings of fruit, one citrus or tomato; a serving of meat, fish, cheese or eggs; one serving of a whole grain cereal and enough other foods to satisfy the appetite.

It is in this last class that the person wishing to reduce, limits his choice. Likewise the person wishing to gain in weight should increase the amount of high caloric value.

The quality of both diets will be equally good if based on the above meal planning pattern. It is the calories that make the difference.

A low caloric recipe which will fit into the typical family menu is:

Baked Tomatoes

6 firm medium tomatoes
 1/2 cup well seasoned French Dressing
 2 tsp. cracker crumbs
 2 tsp. melted butter
 1/2 & up thsp. grated cheese.

Wash and cut a thin slice from the top of each tomato, then hollow them out slightly. Place 1 tablespoon French
