In the local daily press reports of the terrible tragedy that occurred in New Jersey the other day when an airplane crashed into a house, killing its two occupants and five people in the house, nothing was said about the five people killed, being colored. ANTI-LYNCHING LAW

The Lindbergh kidnapping outrage caused a federal law to be passed against this kind of crime.

It is openly admitted and facts prove that the several states are helpless to prevent lynchings.

The States subjected to a federal anti-lynching law on the ground that it would be interfering with State Rights. It is submitted that a Federal law against lynching would not encroach upon the rights of the State any more than the kidnapping law.

The Kidnapping Law was enacted because of the wave of public indignation over the Lindbergh case. America should come to the same conclusion as to lynching. The brutal lynching in Maryland was in every particular just as terrible as the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby. And from one point of view, it was more horrible. The law enforcement officers did nothing to prevent it. The culprits are known. The naked body of the victim was hanged before the house of a judge. The organized legal machinery of the State was defied.

The federal law against kidnapping has established the precedent. There is no longer any valid argument either against the need or the right of a Federal Anti-Lynching Law. The only requisite is law making officers with the courage to back up an aroused public opinion.

It is not enough to condemn lynching. The press, the pulpit, the Congress, the public must bestir themselves to see that laws are enacted to unite the hands of the Federal Government, so that it can no longer be said there is nothing to be done when a lynching shocks and disgraces every American who is decent.

AN EVIL OF THE RACE TRACK

Federal narcotic officers are revealing through their investigations a cruelty long inflicted upon race-horses. Seven arrests were made at

the Arlington Park track in Chicago recently. The evil that is being attacked with vigor by the Federal Government is what is known as "doping". It is disclosed that more than 200 horses in as many races have been given drugs of various sorts, sometimes to stimulate and sometimes to reduce their speed. Heroin, one of the worst opium derivatives, seems to be the favorite drug. Cocaine comes next. Hashish, known as the "killer drug", is also widely used.

Five indictments were obtained through a Federal grand jury on August 15 against men for giving these narcotics to race horses. It is charged that 250 race-horses have been given narcotics at race-tracks in Chicago and through the South and East. Three men arrested at the Arlington Park race have been sentenced to Leavenworth Penitentiary for three years. Two other men have been convicted and sent to the penitentiary.

This is an evil of which the Federal Government say, "We are going to prosecute to the limit and stamp out". That this thing has been going on for a long time on our race-tracks has been thoroughly well known by horsemen and others familiar with the races. All horse lovers will rejoice that the Federal Government through its narcotic officers is attacking this outrage upon one of man's best friends.
