NEWS WHILE IT IS YET NEWSY

Dredger Output on Fooths Creek.

A recent dispatch from Medford states that shipments of from \$800 to \$2000 in dust and nuggets have been made regularly every week through the Jackson County Bank from the output of the Champlin dredger on Fooths Creek. The dredger has made but a slight showing as yet on the vast acreage of ground it has available on Fooths Creek, and will operate winter and summer, the water on Fooths Creek being sufficiently high to float the machine by the system of wing dams placed below it. Just at present the dredger is closed down to give opportunity for the change of power from steam to electricity, the poles and wires having been strung from the power plant of the Condor Water & Power Company at Gold Ray.

A few years ago it was decided that dredging could not be profitably followed in Southern Oregon, and the decayed hulks of several "gold ships" now going to wreck on Southern Oregon streams are silent reminders of wasted capital and energy. However Manager Champlin states it was not the fault of the diggings, but of the machines. Dredgers that will operate successfully in other districts of the West will not handle the cemented ground and heavy boulders of the Southern Oregon channels.

During the month there were 14 clear days, 7 partly clear days and 7 cloudy days.

Temperature—mean max. 56.67; mean min. 34.88; mean 45.77. Max. 71 on 26th; min. 17, on 12th; greatest daily range 33.

Precipitation—Total for month, 1.08 inches. Greatest in 24 hours, .47 inches on 19th.

Total precipitation for season 15.44 inches; same for last season, 29.22 inches.
