**Better Service for Jacksonville Railroad.**

President W. S. Barnum of the Rogue River Valley Railroad arrived home Sunday from the Sound where he had been to purchase another locomotive for his railroad.

At Olympia he purchased a fine locomotive that had been used on the road from Olympia to Tenino. It is of 22 tons weight and for its size is a very powerful engine and it can pull fully double the load that either of the two locomotives now in use on the road can haul. The new locomotive was brought to Jacksonville Tuesday evening on a flat car and Wednesday morning Mr. Barnum with a force of men built up an incline and run it off to the main track. Mr. Barnum has sold their little engine to Portland parties and it will be shipped at once to that city. Their large engine they will retain to use when extra work is required, or repairs are necessary to their other locomotive. The large passenger coach he lately purchased from the Southern Pacific is being repainted and put in firstclass order for use to handle better the greatly increased passenger traffic that has come this spring between this place and Medford. In anticipation of the heavy freight and passenger traffic that he expects this summer Mr. Barnum is having new ties put down on the track wherever the ties are showing signs of weakness. For the present no change in the time card will be made, only the two round trips a day is being made, but later on additional trips may be made should there be traffic to justify the change.

**Oregon Pioneer Association.**

Arrangements are being made for the holding of the thirty-first annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association, to be held in Portland on Wednesday, June 17. All persons coming to, or born in, the original territory of Oregon prior to February 14, 1859, without regard to where they now live, are eligible to membership. Beginning with June 15 Pioneer headquarters will be opened on the top floor of the city hall, where badges may be secured from the secretary, Geo. H. Himes.

The formal program will be given in the Exposition building Wednesday afternoon, June 17, and will include the following numbers. Music by Brown's band; prayer, Grand Chaplain D. B. Gray, 1851, Portland; annual address, Hon. C. W. Fulton, Astoria; music, by band; occasional address, O. C. Applegate, Klamath Falls agency; music by band; benediction, chaplain. At the close of the program the Pioneer Women's Auxiliary will give a banquet to all members in good standing who have the proper badge for 1903. Special invitations will be issued to the husbands or wives of Pioneers, who may not be pioneers themselves, upon application to Mr. Himes. Reduced rates have been granted by all transportation companies for those desiring to attend the reunion.
