

County Court Notes.

County court will convene next Wednesday. Other than the ordinary routine and the auditing of bills, three road petitions will be up for consideration. One is for a road leaving the county road three miles east of Medford at the north-west corner of W. W. Taylor's place, thence running in an easterly direction, crossing the ridge about a mile south of Roxyann butte, to a terminus on the Ashland-Antelope road on the place of Wm. Myer. This road will be about seven miles long and will have a grade over which a loaded team can easily travel. It will lessen the distance more than one-half for the residents of Climax vicinity in coming to Medford and Jacksonville, and it is a road that is a necessity to all the upper Antelope valley.

Another road to be asked for, over which there has been some controversy in the past, is to be on the east side of Bear creek, beginning on the Medford-Eagle Point road at J. G. Hodges' place about three miles north-east of Medford and running in a north-westerly direction to a terminus on the Central Point-Eagle Point road near the Central Point cemetery. This road will give a short connection between two of the main highways of the county and also give an outlet to several farmers, who heretofore have had to pass over private property to reach a county road.

An extension of the Elk creek road is asked for. The new road will begin at the present terminus of the Elk creek in section 23, township 32 south, range 2 east and extend in a south-easterly direction about eight miles to the D. Pence cabin in section 18, township 32 south, range 2 east. This road is given an outlet to a large number of homesteads on Upper Elk and it will be of much benefit in opening up that part of the county.

Another petition to be acted upon by the court is one from Central Point asking that Robert Williams be appointed constable for Central Point precinct.

G. A. R. Censures Medford Enquirer.

At a meeting of Chester A. Arthur Post No. 47, G. A. R., Dept. of Oregon, the following resolutions were offered and passed by a unanimous vote:

WHEREAS, the Enquirer, a paper published in Medford by Horace Mann, did publish in its issue of May 23, 1903, an article, the trend and substance of which was evidently to belittle, vilify and degrade, so far as in the power of the writer to do, the character and standing of the chief executive of the nation, the Honorable Theodore Roosevelt; and

WHEREAS, this slanderous article appeared not in the heat of a political campaign, but while the President was on a friendly visit to our country and state, and was without any provocation whatever; therefore be it

RESOLVED that, while we are not a partisan or political body, but old soldiers and sailors who helped to defend this Nation against its armed assailants, we do most emphatically denounce this and all such language being applied through the press or otherwise to our Chief Executive.

RESOLVED that these resolutions be presented to The Mail and Southern Oregonian with the request that they publish the same.

Work Progressing on O. & P. R. R.

Both crews of the Oregon & Pacific railroad survey were in town Sunday receiving the first payment for work done. The line southward, up to Saturday last, had been run seven miles, reaching the summit between the headwaters of the south branch of Mill creek and a small stream flowing westerly. The survey in several places crosses the long inland curves of the down coast wagon road. It was the intention to drop back this week and set grade stakes over that portion that preliminary work has been done. The grade is fair, as shown by the leveling instruments. Work has been somewhat retarded on account of the great difficulty of getting through the dense growth of redwood trees, and over the numerous large fallen timbers.

The crew running northward has also been in heavy timber, and not until the south end of Smith River Valley is reached will they have open country. Through the Valley and on northward, the difficulty of heavy timber will be avoided to a great extent. Both crews started in about 7 miles eastward of this city. The line southward will pass through the heart of the redwood belt, extending to Trinidad, Humboldt country, and the work of course will be slow. About 15 years ago a party representing Villard, one of the best known railroad promoters of the time, passed over almost the identical route now being run by the Oregon & Pacific, southward.—Crescent City Record.
