### Death of Mrs. Sarah Owens.

Died very suddenly at her home near Eagle Point, Oregon, Monday evening, June 1, 1903, Mrs. Sarah Owens, beloved wife of Wm. Owens. There were none of the family present at the time of her death. Mr. Owens was one of the judges at the election, and the other members of the family had gone to Eagle Point. Mr. Owens left Mrs. Owens in the best of health, and returning about 9 o'clock in the evening, on entering the house missed Mrs. Owens and calling her received no reply. He then went to her bedroom and found her in bed dead. Mrs. Owens maiden name was Sarah Harper. She was born February 24, 1839, in Vermillion county, Indiana. She was married to Wm. Owens May 31, 1855 and moved to Lane county, Oregon, in 1865, where they have since resided. To Mr. and Mrs. Owens were born ten children. One son has passed to the great beyond, nine survive their mother, Cal, James, John, George, Zuda, Agnes, and Mrs. Henry Gregory, of Jackson Co., Mrs. Grimes of Dallas, Or., and Mrs. Brown of Salem, Or.

The funeral services were conducted by A. J. Hanby, Wednesday at 2 o'clock. Interment was made in the Central Point cemetery. Mrs. Owens was held in high esteem by all who knew her. She was a devoted wife and mother. Her home and family were very near and dear to her and all will sadly miss her as the days go by. A large concourse of friends from all parts of the county were present at the funeral to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed and to express their condolence and sympathy with the bereaved family. Many beautiful floral tributes were laid on the newly made mound by loving hands and sorrowing hearts.

It was but last Saturday that Mrs. Owens placed flowers on her son's grave. Little did her friends think that she would so soon be laid by his side. "Mother, thy life's race has been well run,
