He spent five years at Fort Klamath and for the past 14 years he has been at Vancouver Barracks. But he has quit the army service and will spend his declining days in Southern Oregon. Mr. Ish is one of the five Ish brothers, all well known Southern Oregon pioneers, and he is the last one living of his brothers, who were Mathew, William, Jack and Horace.

The annual migration of frogs from Lake Ewauna to Upper Klamath lake began this week. There are millions of them. He hopes soon to locate a tree on the lower lands where it will be easy of access.
