Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Hubert, William Deniff and Miss Dora Margreiter returned Sunday from their outing trip to the Grayback mountain district at the head of Thompson creek. The party report a delightful time. Hunting there was none for there appeared to be no deer in the mountains but the streams were teeming with fish so there was no lack of sport. They state that the snow is from 5 to 15 feet deep on all the depressions on Grayback and water everywhere on the lower levels and grass in abundance.

The stock ordinance for Jacksonville provides that hogs, sheep, stock, cattle, and horses shall not run at large in the streets of the town at any hour, day or night, but milk cows are permitted the freedom of the city during the day, but at night, from 9 p. m. to 5 a. m. they must keep off the streets. For some time hogs have been on the streets from time to time to the serious damage of yards and gardens and some of the cows have not been heeding the hoodlum bell as they should and the "lowing herds" have not been doing the "homeward coming" that they should, much to the disturbance of the peaceful slumbers of sundry citizens and the ruin of flowers and cabbage in enclosures to which the gate was not securely fastened. The hot weather proving a little enervating on the 240 pounds avoirdupois of the city marshal that worthy official has been taking some healthful exercise of late by getting up sprinting stunts with these obstreperous swine and kine with the city pound as the stake boat, with the result that the city treasury is somewhat the richer, and midnight forays by inquisitive cows, with a sequence of a man in brief costume, rocks, clubs, cows, skinned chins and profanity, is a thing of the past and now the midnight hour is left "to darkness and to me."

Henry Kubli, who has a big farm on Applegate, is a farmer who carries out the idea that the less bought and the more sold the more prosperous a farmer may become. In the way of field, garden and orchard products he endeavors to raise every thing that is required for home use. In repairs, that had drain on so many farmers income, he reduces to a minimum by having ample storage room for all his machinery and tools, allowing none to stand out in the weather. And when repairs are necessary he does most of them himself, for he is a good mechanic. He has a shop with good tools and a blacksmith outfit together with a lathe and a drill. He is thus able to do any ordinary job of repairing that may be required. This summer he has added a feed mill to his farm equipments. It is fitted with steel grinders that are driven by an overshot wheel by water from the big irrigation ditch that he has on his place. This water wheel also furnishes power to run his lathe, drill, grindstone and other machinery. By thus equipping his farm Mr. Kubli is able to make certain that his expenditures do not exceed his receipts and he is reasonably certain of making his farm a profitable investment.

A. O. U. W. Grand Lodge.

The 25th annual session of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., of Oregon, concluded its work on Friday July 24th. The new plan of assessment rates, recently adopted by the Supreme Lodge, was thoroughly discussed, but after mature consideration it was deemed advisable to postpone action thereon at this time.
