

Jacksonville Wins Championship.

Things were doing fast enough for professional ball playing on the Neuber & Taylor grounds last Sunday afternoon when the Grants Pass and Jacksonville nines met to decide the baseball championship of Southern Oregon. A large crowd greeted the players who went at the game from the outset with determination marked on every face. Grants Pass went to bat first and retired without a score, as did the home team. In the second inning an error on the part of Jacksonville permitted the visitors to score twice. But after that Lester, Jacksonville's pitcher, coolly and deliberately twirled his mystifiers over the plate sending the Grants Pass boys to the field five consecutive times with as many goose eggs. In the eighth inning two of the visitors slipped around the diamond, and it took the tenth inning to play off the tie resulting from Numan's tally in the ninth. The game was marked throughout by excellent work on the part of the batteries, Lester making the phenomenal record of eleven strike-outs. Brilliant fielding was also much in evidence. Errors were very few and the score remained excitingly close throughout. The game was free from wrangling and the championship was won by the Jacksonville team by a hard-fought battle and from a gentlemanly set of opponents.

Next Sunday the champions will play Medford on the Jacksonville grounds.
