 In the Name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Suit within ten days from the date of the service of this Summons upon you, if served within this County, or if served within any other County of this State, then within twenty days from the date of the service of this Summons upon you; and if by publication, then on or before the expiration of six weeks from the commencement of such publication and if you fail so to answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will take a default against you, and will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in her complaint, viz: For the dissolution of the marriage contract now existing between the plaintiff and defendant, and for the award to plaintiff of the care and custody of the minor child of said parties, and such further relief as to the Court may seem equitable.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Sealed proposals will be received by the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, for the construction of a County road as follows:—Beginning at the Swayne ford on Applegate and following the line of survey of said road along the East side of Applegate Creek southerly to the intersection of the said proposed road with the present traveled County road above the second crossing of said stream a distance of six miles more or less.

Also beginning at the terminus of the present County Road at Watkins ford on Applegate Creek, thence along the west side of Applegate following the line of survey to the state line between California and Oregon.

Said road to be constructed 13 feet wide around the rock point where Swayne flume is situated, and at all other points where heavy grading is required at least 9 feet wide and to be cleared at all points at least 16 feet wide, excavations into solid earth to be not less than seven feet at any point where grading is done.

Bids will be entertained for all the road or for each of the following sections:

1st section begins at the commencement of the road at the Swayne ford and extends to the three mile post on Newt Lewis' ranch.

2nd section from the three mile post to the intersection of said proposed road with the present traveled road near the Dewes ford on Applegate about 3 1/4 miles.

3rd section begins at the end of the present county road and extends to the State line about 2 1/2 miles.

All bidders will be required to give good and sufficient bonds to the full amount of their contract that the road will be completed in accordance with specifications and within the time specified in the contract. Work to be completed by December 1st 1903. The County reserves the right to reject any and all bids. All bids must be submitted to the County Court at its next session, Wednesday, Sept. 2, 1903.
