That being a new legal day no court can be held and Judge Hanaa will not commence court until Tuesday morning of next week. Clarence Hafer superintendent of the Iowa Lumber Company went down to Grants Pass Wednesday afternoon returning by Thursday night train, the object of his trip being to buy a large lot of lumber for his company, most of which will be shipped direct to their wholesale yard in Council Bluffs, but a part of it will be first brought to Jacksonville and put through the planing mill. The Iowa Lumber Company has more orders than they can fill and at their Eastern yard they could sell double the lumber that they can ship from Oregon.

H. T. Mitchell of the firm of Mitchell Bros., liverymen in Ashland, was here Wednesday on a business trip. He was accompanied by his father-in-law, B. F. Poley, of Wallowa county who is making a visit with relatives in Ashland. This is Mr. Poley's first visit to this part of the state and he is well pleased with the country and its resources. While in this place he visited the grounds of P. Britt and was greatly surprised to see the palms, lemon and banana trees and other plants and shrubs of tropic and semitropic varieties growing in the open yard.

The Ashland Preserving Company is working up to its average capacity, says the Tribune, and the canning department is just finishing the black-berries and making a good beginning on peaches and string beans. Next week they will commence putting up tomatoes and Bartlett pears. Their output of preserves, catchup, jams, jellies, fruit butters, chili sauce, etc., is quite extensive. The plant's full capacity is 10,000 cans per day and during this season it will turn out 6,000 cans per day for a time during the tomato season. An average of fifty hands is employed, largely women and girls.

A. F. McCrary, who has a small ranch on the hill south of town and who is demonstrating that the hills back of Jacksonville are capable of producing many kinds of fruit successfully, as well as farm crops, has left for the Sentinel office exhibit two stone Indian relics and a fine grained whetstone or hone, that for quality compares very well with the best hones made from rock in the East. It is almost as fine grained as the famous Turkish hones and it will put a very keen edge on a knife. The rock is from a big ledge of rock in the Siskiyou mountains south of Ashland and there is little doubt that eventually the quarry will be developed and the manufacture of fine hones will be added to the line of industries of Southern Oregon.

County Treasurer D. H. Miller was over from Medford Tuesday to look after the affairs of his office, which is being conducted by Deputy Treasurer Robert Dow for the present while there is little doing in the office. Every account was balanced up to a cent for Mr. Dow is a very thorough bookkeeper. Accompanying Mr. Miller was Rev. E. A. Childs

of Eugene, but formerly from the East. Rev. Childs is supply for the present in the pulpit of the Christian church in Medford and he is so well pleased with the town and country that he may assume the regular pastorate of the church and become a permanent resident of Medford. Rev. Childs on seeing some of the Jacksonville Board of Trade letter heads and envelopes paid them the complement of telling more in fewer words than any immigration literature he had yet seen.
