County Commissioners' Court Meets.

The County Commissioners' Court met in regular session at the court house in Jacksonville Thursday, Sept. 3, with County Judge Prim, County Clerk Orth, Sheriff Rader and Commissioners Riley and Patterson present.

Reports of county officers were examined, compared and approved.

In the matter of a petition of A. C. Nicholson for a change in the county road leading through his place, it having been lawfully advertised, it was ordered that M. M. Clark, Ed Scott and J. M. Harley be appointed viewers and Carl T. Jones surveyor to lay out a new route and report at the October session.

In the matter of bids for the construction of the Boaz road up the Applegate, bids having been received for a portion of the road only, and all bids being considered too high, they were rejected and the county clerk was instructed to readvertise for bids giving bidders until January 30th, 1904, to complete the work, all bids to be on file by October 7, 1903.

Jason Hartman's bid of \$575 for the construction of the Centennial bridge at Gold Hill was accepted.

The resignation of G. W. Stevens as road supervisor of district No. 15 was accepted and T. J. West was appointed in his place to fill the unexpired term.

In the matter of the petition of J. G. Phipps and others asking for viewers to mark out a new county road it was ordered that Carl T. Jones, as surveyor, and S. G. VanDyke and David Linn, as viewers, meet on September 16th for that purpose.

In the matter of a county road petitioned for by W. H. Stinson and others, it was ordered that County Surveyor Jones and Geo. Brown and I. W. Thomas, viewers, meet on September 22d and mark out the road.
