Mr. Stafford does most of his trading at Talent, going from his place by a trail across the hills to Wagner creek. He had the spring wagon to haul his supplies from Talent to the end of the road on Wagner creek and from there on to his place he took them on pack horses. Mr. Stafford is a retired printer leaving Puget Sound to get away from the excessively wet climate of that section and seek relief from rheumatism in the balmy, dry climate of Rogue River Valley. For years Mr. Stafford was foreman for Loman & Hanaford, who conduct the largest job printing house in Seattle. Mr. Stafford and his wife and children are taking things easy at their mountain retreat and are living on the fat of the land literally, for they raise ample garden and fruit supplies, have plenty of butter eggs and meats. Wild blackberries, raspberries and plums are for the picking and bee trees in any number supply all the honey they may require. Last year Mr. Stafford cut seven bee trees and this year has cut two and has several more located to cut when wanted. Fish and game are to be had in plenty. A band of hogs of which he will have 40 for sale this winter, afford the money to buy clothing and groceries.
