L. Neidermeyer who last year bought 500 acres of the Bybee tract a mile north of town, is having a neat appearing cottage erected on the Jacksonville road to be occupied by Fred Hackert, who has rented a part of Mr. Neidermeyer's land. The house is 30x30 feet, 10 foot walls and has five rooms. The carpenter work is being done by Wm. Hall of Sams Valley and the painting by Fred Hackert. Mr. Hackert came from Gage county Nebraska last year and has been living on another part of Mr. Neidermeyer's farm, but he will move this week to the new cottage. Mr. Hackert is one of those thrifty, industrious Germans who will rent but a few years for he will soon have a home of his own.

There was a time when Applegate had the reputation of producing the finest fruit of any section of Rogue River Valley, but with coming of the codlin moth and the San Jose scale the farmers of that valley let their orchards with few exceptions go to ruin and turned their attention to alfalfa and cattle. In this industry they have made big money, but they could add another source of income with no interference to their stock business by again taking up fruit raising. William Cameron, one of the Applegate farmers who kept his orchard in good shape and the result is that he brings to Jacksonville market apples that for size, color and freedom from blemish are hard to beat in any orchard. Within the next few years Applegate will be sending to market thousands of boxes of all kinds of fruit.

In the Review of Reviews for October are two articles on the problem of the country school which deserve special attention. Professor Hays, of the University of Minnesota, writes on "Our Farmer Youth and the Public Schools," showing what is being done in many parts of the country, through school consolidation and the development of agricultural high schools, to give the country boy and girl the advantages of a connected, well-adjusted, and rational system of public instruction, while Superintendent Kern, of Rockford, Ill., in a brief illustrated article, gives the results of practical efforts among farmer boys in his country in the direction of interesting the boys in the business of farming and of teaching them the things worth knowing in their rural environment.

The first commercial orchards of Rogue river valley were planted in the Bear creek valley, which has become the fruit center of Southern Oregon, but within the last two years many fruit trees have been planted in other valleys of the streams that are tributary to Rogue river. Sams Valley which heretofore has been devoted to grain and stock will likely become a fruit district as well for it has the same climate and soil as the other sections of Rogue river valley and should produce as fine fruit as to be had in Southern Oregon. This section is within convenient distance of the railroad and when good turnpike roads are built it will be an easy matter to get fruit to market. One of the first farmers of that valley to undertake fruit raising on a large scale is William Hall who last winter set out 800 apple trees, 400 Newtowns and 400 Spitzenburgs. He will this winter make the beginning on a pear orchard by planting a 100 or more pear trees, probably Winter Nellis, as that variety appears to be the leading variety. Each winter hereafter Mr. Hall and his sons expect to plant more fruit trees until they get about 20 or 25 acres to orchard, which will be as much as they can well care for.
