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County Court Proceedings.

The Commissioners court convened in regular session at the court house in Jacksonville, Wednesday, October 7, 1903, with the following officers present: Judge Prim, County Clerk Orth, Sheriff Rader, Commissioners Riley and Patterson. The September journal was read and approved and the reports of the county officers were read and approved.

In the matter of the proposed change in the county road on Rogue river in section 30, tp 33 s, r 1 w petitioned for by J. W. Berrian and others county surveyor Jones with Frank Brown and S. B. Holmes were appointed viewers to mark out the route of the proposed road and assess the value of right of way, meeting October 19th. therefor.

Ordered that \$27 be drawn and applied to road work in road district No. 15. In matter of county road petitioned for by J. W. Wetzel and others a protest filed by 24 freeholders was read and the petition ordered dismissed.

In the matter of county road petitioned for by J. G. Phipps and others the report of the surveyor and viewers was accepted and the road ordered opened. Damages were allowed to Geo. W. Kincaid in the sum of \$50.

The county road petitioned for by A. E. Nicholson and others was ordered opened.

The county road petitioned for by W. H. Simson and others was ordered opened and damages were allowed to L. E. Coleman in the sum of \$100, W. H. Stewart for \$50 and E. M. Cox and Susan Crann for \$200.

In the matter of the advertisement for bids for the construction of the county road along the east side of the Applegate, contracts were awarded for its construction. For the first section from the Swayne ford to the three mile post on Newt Lewis' ranch, the contract was awarded to E. G. Perham of Gold Hill, for \$2800. The contract to open up the other two sections, 3 1/4 miles to Dewes ford, and 2 1/2 miles to the state line, was awarded to Geo. P. Firman for \$2650 and \$1040, respectively.

Both contractors have furnished bonds which were accepted and they were given until July 1, 1904, to complete the contract.

Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Cronemiller arrived Sunday from Fort Klamath and remained until Tuesday, guests at the home of Mr. Cronemiller's brother, David Cronemiller and of his nephew, James Cronemiller, when they started on the return trip to their home. Accompanying Mr. and Mrs. Cronemiller was Miss Kate Cronemiller, who had been making them a visit for the past month. Mr. and Mrs. Cronemiller were from residents of Jacksonville and moved to Klamath county 20 years ago where Mr. Cronemiller engaged in the stock business. He started in with no capital but with lots of energy and sticktoitiveness and now he has a fine ranch, a big herd of cattle and is rated at \$25,000. Just before starting for Jacksonville he sold 70 head of beeves and he will sell 30 more on his return. He has 200 more cattle that could go as beef but owing to the present low price of cattle he thinks it more profitable to hold them over for another year.

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
