David and Thomas Tucker, cattlemen of Harney county are spending a week with their mother, Mrs. L. Tucker of Eden precinct. They were called home by the illness of their mother, but who is now much improved.

Clarence Reames returned Wednesday from Salem, where he had been to appear with his brother, A. E. Reames, as attorney for Mrs. Mary Hanley in the case of Ellen J. Kubli vs Mary Hanley, appealed to the supreme court by the plaintiff and heard by the court Tuesday. Clarence made the opening argument before the court, this being his first appearance before the supreme court and he acquitted himself with credit, so state others who were present. The attorneys for Mrs. Kubli are Judge E. B. Watson of Portland and Judge Chas. Prim. The case involves a widow's dower right and the point at issue is whether Mrs. Hanley is entitled to a third interest, as provided by the old law, in the estate of her late husband, John A. Hanley, or to a half interest as allowed by the new law.

Terry Byrne of Upper Applegate arrived in Jacksonville Sunday with a load of farm produce and Monday not being able to dispose of it satisfactorily in Jacksonville he drove to Medford where he sold his produce and bought a load of supplies of the merchants of that place.

The Southern Pacific company has inaugurated a system for the convenience of shippers from the east, which will no doubt be appreciated by them. Hereafter local agents of the Southern Pacific will be advised daily by postal card of shipments in carload lots coming over the Union Pacific, O. S. L. and O. R. & N. lines, passing Council Bluffs, Kansas City, Grainger, Pocatello and Huntington. Parties to whom these shipments are consigned will be immediately notified by the agent, so that they will be kept posted as to the movements of their shipments. The advantage to the consignee of this system are apparent. Instead of a shipment of goods practically disappearing until it shows up at its destination, the consignee can keep track of it, and know just when to look for its arrival, thus being prepared for its reception. Agents are instructed to communicate with the consignee by messenger, telephone or orally, never resorting to the mails, unless other means are unavailable.

Rial Benedict came in Monday by Wendt's stage from his home near the Applegate postoffice and stopped over night in Jacksonville returning the next day by stage to his home. Mr. Benedict is a pioneer of 1852, settling in the Willamette valley, living for a year in Corvallis. In 1854 he came to Jackson county and took up a fine place on Applegate on which he with his family has since resided. Mr. Benedict is still hale and strong and gets about as well as a young man. Recently he sold 200 acres of land that he had on the west side of the Applegate and across the river from his home farm to J. G. Grubb for a price close to \$5000. Mr. and Mrs. Benedict expect Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Jackson and Mrs. Jennie Bagley on a visit to them next week from Chicago. Mrs. Bagley is their daughter and Mr. Jackson a nephew of theirs. Dr. Bagley is unable to accompany Mrs. Bagley on this trip as he is unable to leave his practice.
