Plans of the Iowa Lumber & Box Co.

Mr. C. Hafer and E. E. Hart having bought out the interests of the other stockholders in the Iowa Lumber Company, they have incorporated it under the name of the Iowa Lumber and Box Company. Mr. Hafer remains president of the reorganized company as does Mr. Hart treasurer. The secretary of the new company is H. J. Forsythe. The headquarters of the Company will continue at Council Bluffs with the principal place of business at Jacksonville for the present. The Company have under consideration the proposition of moving their box factory and planing mill and possibly the saw mill to Medford. The matter will be definitely settled when President Hafer and Treas. Hart arrive here from Council Bluffs which will be in about a month. The removal of the box factory and planing mill and lumber yard to Medford is contingent on that town giving a cash bonus of \$3000 and the removal of the saw mill will be made if satisfactory arrangements can be made with Mr. Barnum of the Medford-Jacksonville railroad for transportation of logs, they hauling the logs by team from the woods to the railroad at this place, where they would be loaded upon cars and taken to Medford. If no arrangements can be made with Mr. Barnum then the mill will be left in the woods and the lumber hauled by team direct to Medford.

The reason given for their proposed removal to Medford is to have their entire plant on one plat of ground and to have ample space for the lumber yard adjoining it. To secure a pond for holding logs is also another reason for their removal, they planning to locate their mill on Bearcreek and put in a dam in that stream. They also wish to get where they can get better car service, they claiming that Mr. Barnum is too careless in handling their cars, sometimes leaving them for 24 hours in Medford before bringing them over and then when he does bring them often delaying them by not placing them at once on their loading switch. The Medford people are stirring themselves to raise the \$3000 bonus but if they fail the Company will remain in Jacksonville as it would cost them over \$5000 to remove their buildings, machinery and lumber yard, with an additional \$10,000 to build a dam across Bear creek and to put in three-fourths of a mile of railroad to connect their mill with the Southern Pacific track and with the Jacksonville railroad.
