BOARD OF TRADE IN SESSION.

Propositions Important to Jacksonville Discussed and Special Committees Appointed to Carry out Work of Board.

The Jacksonville board of trade held a meeting Monday evening at the town hall that was well attended by the business men of the town.

The first matter up for consideration was the report of the special committee that had been investigating the feasibility of improving the Jacksonville-Medford road. Judge Day chairman of the committee and George Lewis and Charles Dunford each stated that they did not think it possible to make a permanent road down Jackson creek and after having investigated the various proposed routes to which to change the road that they had decided that the best route and the one that would be cheapest in the long run would be to extend the Medford road direct west through the Karewski and Miller places to an intersection with Valley street at Mr. Fick's place. This route would give an airline road between Jacksonville and Medford and on a location where no interference would be had by either Jackson creek or Daisy creek. While this change would damage the property through which it ran, yet taking the road from the present location in the creek channel would enable the adjoining land owners to bulkhead Jackson creek and retain it in its present channel and to prevent it from overflowing and burying their land in the tailings that pour down the creek each winter. A general discussion of the subject followed the committee's report, the tenor of which was to agree with the committee in the selection of the direct route for the new road. The need for the betterment of the Central Point road was also brought up and it was fully agreed that a change of route for that road from Hanley Butte to the Medford road should be secured. Jackson creek has taken possession of this road too and a few floods will so wash out the road that it will be impossible to travel. The plan that met the approval of the board was to relocate the road from Hanley Butte along the east side of the present road to the dividing line between the Hanley and the Duncan farms and then go direct south along this line to an intersection with the Medford road. This would not increase the distance at all between Central Point and Jacksonville, while the change in the Medford-Jacksonville route would shorten that road nearly half a mile. By a vote it was decided to adopt the proposed changes in these roads and a special committee of five was appointed by President Meserve, consisting of Gus Newbury, J. Nunan, S. J. Day, George Lewis and Henry Wendt to prepare the necessary petition, secure the signatures, and present the petition to the county court, the intention being to lay the petition before the court at the December term.

The need of a morning mail service between Jacksonville and Medford was considered and a special committee consisting of Jas. Cronemiller, M. M. Taylor and C. P. Briggs was appointed to get up a petition and secure the indorsement of Congressman Hermann and then forward the petition to the postoffice department. The matter of securing a more satisfactory arrangements of the precinct boundaries was also considered and a special committee consisting of John S. Orth, Gus Newbury and C. L. Reames was appointed to present the matter at the November term of county court.
