### Death of E. D. Foudray.

The old pioneers of Jackson County will be surprised and shocked to learn of the death of Hon. E. D. Foudray who for the past fifteen years has resided in Phoenix, this county.

Mr. Foudray was one of the pioneers of the county, and there is scarcely an old pioneer either in Jackson, Josephine, Klamath or Lake who is not acquainted with E. D. Foudray. He came to Oregon in the early fifties and has resided in this county ever since arriving here. For a time he prospected and mined in Siskiyou county California at Yreka and at other mining camps in that state, and learning of the rich strike made in the vicinity of Jacksonville he with others left that county and came to Jacksonville.

In the early history of the county he was prominent in politics and was a regular attendant at all democratic conventions where his voice and influence were always considered. He was born in the south in Kentucky and inherited his democratic tendencies. The writer of this article has heard him recite reminiscences of Henry Clay, personal reminiscences, and he was always impressed with the extreme courtesy of manner of that distinguished statesman.

Mr. Foudray was born in Kentucky about 82 years ago and had several brothers and sisters, one of whom resides in Oregon in the Willamette Valley.

In 1876 Mr. Foudray was nominated for County Clerk on the democratic ticket and was elected, and he was renominated in 1876 and reelected, serving in that capacity for a period of four years.

He has filled other positions in the county in the capacity of deputy and always with efficiency. Mr. Foudray's genial, hospitable disposition and his power of attractive, reminiscent recital will always be remembered by those who came in contact with him when in his prime of manhood. Political antagonists he had, but enemies, none, and he will long be remembered for his kindly disposition and manner, and his generous impulses.

He is survived by his wife Mrs. Sarah Abi Foudray who resides at Phoenix. They have had no children. Funeral services will be held at Phoenix, Oregon at the Presbyterian church on Saturday at 1 o'clock p. m.

This the Professor has agreed to do, and the committee will arrange with him as to the time and place.
