

County Court Proceedings.

County Court met Wednesday of this week with the usual officers in attendance, and is still in session. Aside from the usual routine work the court has a big task to be handled in the work of adjusting the precinct boundaries of the county. While their actions are not yet complete yet it is about certain that Pooh Bah precinct will be cut out and divided between Jacksonville, Central Point and Medford voting places. Jacksonville precinct will be divided into two precincts, their boundaries being as follows:

SOUTH JACKSONVILLE.

Beginning with the intersection of the center of California street with the center of Jackson creek, thence up the center of that stream to the first fork, thence up the center of that fork to Cantral Gulch, thence up center of that gulch to the left hand fork, thence up center of that fork to intersection of section lines between sections 26 and 27, tp 37 s, r 3 w, thence south to quarter section corner between sections 10 and 11, tp 38 s, r 3 w, thence east to township line at quarter section corner section 12, tp 38 s, r 3 w, thence south to SW corner section 19, tp 38 s, r 2 w, thence east to SE corner section 20, tp 38 s, r 2 w, thence north to corner of sections 4, 5, 8 and 9, tp 38 s, r 2 w, then east to Griffin creek, thence northerly along west bank of said stream to its intersection with the stage road leading from Jacksonville to Ashland, thence on said road and on California street in the town of Jacksonville to the place of beginning.

NORTH JACKSONVILLE.

Beginning at the same point as in the south precinct, thence along center of Jackson creek to first fork, thence up center of right fork to Cantral Gulch, up center of this gulch to left fork, up center of this fork to line between sections 26 and 27, tp 37 s, r 3 w, thence north to corner between sections 14 and 15, tp 37 s, r 3 w, thence to Griffin creek at a point in section 15, tp 37 s, r 2 w, thence up Griffin creek along west bank to stage road, thence along said road and California street to place of beginning.
