The following is from rule XXIV of the Oregon state board of health:

It shall be the duty of all school boards in all the districts of whatever class in the state of Oregon, to prohibit the entrance into any of the public schools of the state, of all children not previously vaccinated (the evidence of which is shown by the scar), without proper vaccination; and it will be the duty of the teacher or teachers in any of the public schools of the state of Oregon to satisfy themselves that such order has been properly enforced, the evidence being a scar, or by a certificate of vaccination signed by a reputable physician.
