

### Getting Apples for Exhibition.

Hon. John D. Olwell, Oregon's superintendent of horticultural exhibits for the St. Louis Fair, arrived from his home in Jackson county Monday morning and attended a meeting of the State Commissioners. Mr. Olwell is part owner of one of the largest orchards in the state, and was selected for his position by the fact of his being a recognized authority on apples. Speaking of the exhibit for St. Louis, Mr. Olwell said:

"We are doing what we can to get our exhibit in shape to forward to St. Louis and have it placed in cold storage. Southern Oregon will furnish us with a good display of Spitzenberg and Baldwin apples, while other sections of the state will be drawn upon for other varieties. The season is a little late to get as much as we desire, but I am in hopes that we can make a very good showing."

"We have not had as much rain during the summer as usual, but for the past week there have been abundant showers sufficient water having fallen to start the placer miners to work, and many of the claims will have considerable ground worked off by Christmas."

When asked his opinion regarding an extra session of the legislature, of which he is a member on the Democratic side, Mr. Olwell said:

"I think we should have an extra session to straighten out the tax law. My people want it done, for it means a great deal to Jackson county. I favor attending to that legislation and then adjourning. I rather expect to be notified that an extra session has been called."—Telegram.
