Justice W. J. Plymale convened his court Saturday and continued the sessions Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday while hearing arguments and evidence in the case of George E. Neuber, who had brought suit against H. H. Cutler for \$58 and Chas. Bonham for \$38 for "goods and merchandise" supplied to these young men. Mr. Neuber was represented by Clarence Reames and the boys were represented by Gus Newbury. Mr. Newbury brought evidence to show that his client, Chas. Bonham, was under age, and he secured the appointment by the court of a guardian ad litem, H. H. Cutler being chosen to act for the minor, Bonham. As a minor cannot legally incur a debt for "goods and merchandise" at a saloon Mr. Neuber dropped his case against young Bonham, who claimed that he was but 19 years old, though he represented, so Mr. Neuber states, that he was of age when he purchased the wet goods. Young Cutler being of age Mr. Neuber succeeded in collecting \$10 of his account for \$58.
