## Ashland City Election.

Ashland had Tuesday one of the most exciting elections in the history of the town. There were three tickets in the field, the Republicans, the Citizens and the People Non-Partisan, or Anti Saloon League and the fight centered about the saloon question and the Non-Partisan ticket which represented the no license party won out. The officers elected were: Mayor, H. S. Evans; recorder, Milton Berry; treasurer, L. L. Multit; councilmen, first ward, Wm. Fox; second ward, T. F. Smith; third ward, C. C. Chappel.

The entire "Citizens Non-Partisan ticket" as above were elected at the municipal election in Ashland, Tuesday. The successful candidates for treasurer, and councilmen in the second and third wards were also endorsed by the "People's Non-Partisan" or Anti-Saloon League ticket and Recorder Berry was on all tickets for re-election.

The advisory vote on the question of license or no license for saloons in the city during 1904 which all candidates had agreed to abide by, resulted in a victory for the "drys" over the "wets" by a vote of 306 to 282, and Ashland will try legal prohibition again next year.

The proposed charter amendment relating to the further acquirements of city water rights, sewerage extension and city ownership of light and power plant met with little or no active opposition and were endorsed by a large vote.
