Record of Special Session.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Governor Chamberlain today filed the last of the acts passed by the last Legislature, and the record of that body at its special session is complete. Only ten of the bills seem to have effective emergency clauses. A number of others have emergency clauses which merely declares that an emergency exists, but under the referendum amendment it is necessary that in order to put an act into effect at once the Legislature must declare that the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety so requires. Those acts which contain an emergency clause such as is required by the referendum amendment, are marked with an asterisk. All others will take effect in 90 days from December 23.

This corn was grown without the least irrigation and had very little rain for the past summer was an exceptionally dry one for Rogue River Valley. Mr. McCrary had equally good success in growing potatoes and vegetables and the way his land produces is but another proof of the prolific character of the hill land about Jacksonville that can be bought at a very low price for the average Rogue River farmers still holds to the idea that only the bottom lands are productive and that the hill lands are only good for range and timber purposes. The time is not distant when the Jacksonville hills will be covered with vineyards orchards and farms.
