Chris Kenney was elected secretary but has declined to take the office and another secretary will be chosen at the next meeting of the Company.

Prof. and Mrs. A. M. Barnett, of Olequa, Washington were in Jacksonville Monday taking a look at the place while

making a tour of Southern Oregon with a view a selecting a place for a home for themselves. Prof. and Mrs. Barnett were former residents of Newport News, Virginia, the place made famous by the naval battle between Monitor and the Merrimac in the War of Rebellion, but for several years past they have resided in Washington, but they have tired of the wet climate of that section and are seeking a location where the moss will not grow on the kitchen stovepipe nor on the backs of the natives and hearing of the splendid climate of Rogue River Valley they came here to ascertain the facts for themselves. In the spring they will return to Oregon and think that they shall locate in Rogue River Valley. Prof. E. E. Washburn and family returned Friday from a week's visit at Ashland with relatives. They spent a few days on Neil creek where Mr. Washburn's father has charge of a logging camp. The lower saw mill and the logging camps have been in operation all fall and will keep busy all winter unless prevented by a deep snow. There are three four horse teams, a two horse team and a donkey engine at work at present putting in logs, and twelve teams are hauling lumber from the mill to Ashland. A. C. Manning is managing the mill during the winter months. A crew of men are building a flume from the upper to the lower mill, a distance of over a mile, and will probably extend it to the railroad, which is two miles further. All of the lumber can then be flumed to the railroad and shipped from that point at a saving of over \$2 per thousand. The flume will cost about \$4000, but the amount will be saved in a few months in the lessened cost of handling the lumber. The daily capacity of both mills on this creek when working ten hours a day is over 50,000 feet. The greater portion of this lumber is used by the local trade and by the Ashland Manufacturing Company.
