

**All Voters Must Register Again.**

Registration books will be opened by every clerk in the state, January 4, for the purpose of registering voters who desire to participate in the state election next November.

County Clerk John S. Orth has received registration books for Jackson county from the Secretary of the State, and now has them open ready for voters to register.

The registration books will be open from Jan. 4 to May 15. Voters may register by appearing in person before the county clerk or by making the necessary affidavits before a notary public, on blanks furnished by the county clerk. No provision is made by law for opening the registration books after the state election and before the presidential election, so the registration prior to May 15 will be used in determining the qualification of the voters in November.

The qualifications of signers of petitions for the initiative in legislation at the coming election will be determined in the first instance by the registration books of 1902. That is to say, if petitions should be prepared, asking that certain proposed laws or constitutional amendments be submitted to a vote of the people at the June election, the petitions must be submitted to the County Clerks of the counties in which the signers reside.

As initiative petitions must be filed by February 6, four months prior to the general election on June 6, it would not be practicable to use the 1904 registration as a basis for comparison, even though the law permitted the use of that registration. The act of 1903, making effective the initiative and referendum amendment, provides, in section 3, that the county in which any such petition shall be signed shall compare the signatures of the electors signing the same with their signatures on the registration books and blanks on file in his office, "for the preceding general election."

Scarcely more than one month now remains in which to prepare petitions for initiative measures to be submitted to the people in June.

A hydraulic mining plant is being put in on Humbug creek at a point a mile from the Applegate river by Homer White, Samuel Christian and Stephen Benson. These parties already owned two claims on Humbug and last fall they bought 160 acres of land of Mrs. F. Voyle, of Jacksonville which gave them a mile of channel all rich pay gravel. They have completed a large reservoir to impound the waters of Humbug which is a small stream, by storage will give them a good run each day and they are now in-

stalling a No. 2 giant that will have a force of 150 feet, fed by an eight inch pipe. They expect to begin piping next week and as they have every thing in perfect working order and the ground being easily worked they anticipate a good clean up at the close of the season.

W. E. Olmstead, who with S. A. Vance recently purchased the Sturgis placer mine on Forest creek, and which they are now operating under the name of the S. A. Vance Hydraulic Company, was in Jacksonville Saturday attending to the hauling out of a lot more machinery for their mine. A derrick for handling boulders has been set up and to operate it they will use a large donkey engine which is now being put in place. Within another week Mr. Olmstead expects to have their electric light plant in operation when this store, messhouse, dwelling houses, barn and the mine will be lighted with that light. The light plant will be operated by water power. So soon as the electric lights are installed a double crew will be put on piping will be carried on day and night, for it is the plan of the new owners to use the water that is available only during the winter months to the greatest possible limit and thus greatly increase the output of the mine without proportionally increasing the operating expenses. Under the new plan two No. 3 giants will be operated, for which there is plenty of water with ample pressure.
