Wednesday afternoon the board of trade road committee inspected the route of the proposed improvement of the Jackson creek road. Mr. Ulrich taking the other members of the committee over the road in his hack. The committee found that the exact location of the road was not known as the adjoining land owners had moved their fences from the original lines on account of changes in the channel of the creek. As no estimates can be furnished by prospective

contractors until the lines are definitely located the committee have requested Judge Prim to have the county surveyor to relocate the road. This was granted by Judge Prim and County Surveyor Carl T. Jones will make the necessary survey early next week. The committee will have grade stakes set by the engineer and the road built on an even grade for the entire distance.

He will carry on work with only a small force of men for the present, but there is a possibility that the time is not distant when this mine will be employing a large force of men.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Sackett after spending a week in Jacksonville guests at the home of Dr. and Mrs. T. T. Shaw, left Monday for California where they will spend a couple of months in the orange groves. Mr. Sackett and Dr. Shaw are cousins, both Oregon born and of Willamette Valley vintage and it has been 12 years since they previously met. Mr. Sackett is now one of the big stockmen of Montana, having a large ranch near Park City in that state. Mr. Sackett's ranch is in the famous alfalfa district of Montana, where four crops a year are cut. As to their manner of getting a meadow started Mr. Sackett said that so soon as the young alfalfa is a foot high they mow it and leave the grass upon the ground as a mulch to the roots of the alfalfa, causing it to stool out and produce a large crop of hay that year. The next year and there-after three to four crops of hay are cut as is the case here in Rogue River Valley.

The gravity water system for Yreka has been completed and water was turned on last week. A trial of the pressure by the hose company showed that water could be easily thrown far above the highest building in town and the fire company will now discontinue the use of the two fire engines that have done duty so long in that old mining town. The water for Yreka's system is taken from the head of Greenhorn creek and though the stream is small, by a reservoir at the headwaters and another on the hill back of town it is expected that there will be ample water during the dryest seasons for all household and irrigation purposes.
