Ashland having outgrown its school

February 2d, to vote on the proposition

building.

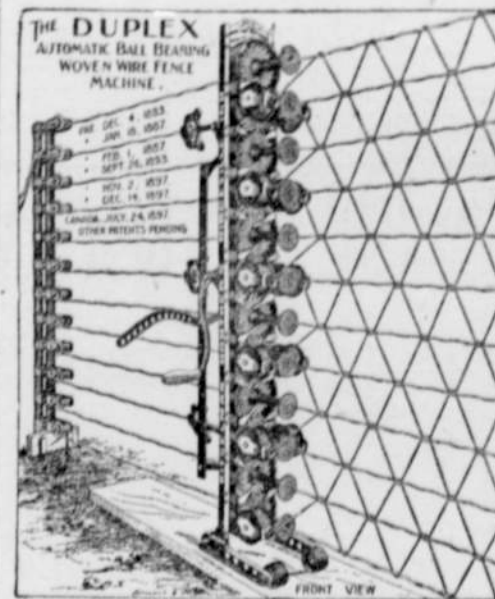
