

LOCAL NOTES.

The Siskiyou county Board of Supervisors has adopted an ordinance levying a tax of five cents per head annually on all sheep pastured or herded in the county. It takes effect February 1st.

The court house yard at Yreka is to be made into a handsome park. The county authorities have ordered a handsome iron fence to enclose the grounds and are having fertilizers put on the ground to insure a vigorous growth to the grass and ornamental shrubs that are to be planted upon it.

The City Attorney, W. E. Phipps, has prepared the anti-slot machine ordinance as desired by the council, which will be submitted at the next regular meeting. It prohibits slot machines altogether in the city and imposes a fine of \$10 to \$100, or imprisonment for 5 or 30 days or both fine and imprisonment for infractions of the ordinance. The slot machine will evidently be surprised in Ashland—Tribune.

Douglas county has 22 saloons of which 22 are in Roseburg, and they pay a license of \$9,200. The lowest license is \$400 and the highest \$800, which is paid by the Myrtle Creek saloon. Jackson county with a population larger than Douglas county has but 12 saloons. Of these five are in Medford, three in Gold Hill, three in Jacksonville and one in Central Point. Ashland, Talent, Phoenix and Eagle Point have no saloon.

The State Treasurer has received from the treasury of the United States the sum of \$90,035.24, as Oregon's share of the Federal Government's land sales fund for the year 1903. The Secretary of the State has apportioned this sum among the different counties of the State according to the acreage of each. Jackson county receives \$2,642.17 the number of acres in this county being 1,786,880. Klamath gets \$5,787.78, Lake \$7,585.83, and Josephine \$1,625.81.

The Jacksonville town council will meet for the February meeting next Tuesday evening, at which time in addition to the regular business, judges and clerks will be appointed for the town election which takes place on the first Tuesday in March. As this month closes the fiscal year for the town officials Recorder, Henry Dox, Treasurer Jas. M. Cronemiller, and Street Commissioner, Chas. Dunford, will each make their annual reports.

Benton Bowers, in his boyhood days a resident of Jacksonville, but who now resides at Ashland where he is one of the leading capitalists of that city is branching out as a farmer and he is now the owner of the big Beckman and Reames ranch, on Rogue river at the mouth of Bear creek, which he bought of W. M. Spence, and he is making it into one of the finest farms in Oregon. Mr. Bowers has 20 men at work on his ranch putting up new buildings, fences and other improvements. He will seed 300 acres of the land to alfalfa, the remainder will be kept for pasture for the fine stock that he will raise.

When co-owners fail to contribute his share of the assessment work on an unpatented mining claim, says the Mining Press, the Federal statute provides that the one doing the work or making the improvements may, at the expiration of the year, give such delinquent co-owner personal notice in writing, or notice by publication in the newspaper published nearest the claim, for at least once a week for ninety days, and, if at the expiration of ninety days, after such notice in writing or by publication, such delinquent co-owner should fail or refuse to contribute his proportion of the expenditure required by the statute, his interest shall become the property of his co-owners, who have made the required expenditure. The county in which the paper is printed is not material. The statute says the paper nearest the claim.

Deputy District Attorney C. L. Reames and Gus Newbury were at Eagle Point Monday the former to represent the State and the latter the defendant in a charge brought in Justice J. R. Cook's court against Eli Dahnack for riding a horse on and doing injury to the sidewalk in the village of Eagle Point. The defense as made by Mr. Newbury for the young man was that the walk he rode on was not in the village of Eagle Point thus freeing him from the penalty of the state, which protects sidewalks in incorporated towns and villages, which in the definition of the law is a collection of dwelling and other houses not included within corporate limits. This defense was controverted by Deputy District Attorney Reames, who proved that there were 11 houses along this walk within the space of half a mile. The jury promptly brought in a verdict of guilty and Justice Cook gave Mr. Dahnack a fine of \$10 and costs which with his attorneys fees made his dare devilry rather an expensive luxury to him and next time when he is requested and then warned to not ride his horse on a sidewalk he will likely heed the admonition, for the residents of Eagle Point have been greatly annoyed by hoodlums riding horses on the village walks and the next offender will get the full limit of the law.

The following news note from the Klamath Falls Republican also applies to Jacksonville in regard to the need of a fine large hotel:

Jas. E. Sullivan, a prominent hotel man from Minnesota, who has been in the city the past two weeks left Wednesday morning for Coos Bay. Mr. Sullivan is looking for a hotel site in the west and was very much impressed with Klamath Falls but states that he was unable to find any one who was willing to sell him property suitable for the purpose. One of Klamath Falls' greatest needs is a large hotel and it is a serious reflection on the city that they should practically turn down a man with ten or fifteen thousand dollars to invest.
