Low Rates to Coast Colonists.

Beginning from the 1st of March the
low one-way rates will be placed in ef-
fect from St. Paul, Chicago, St. Louis,
Kansas City, Omaha and intermediate
points as far West as the Rocky Moun-
tains to Portland and other Northwest
points for settlers or colonist business.
The railroads of the country have been
disposed to offer this inducement to peo-
ple seeking new locations, to enable them
to come to the section of the country of-
fering more inducements at the present
time than any other, in the way of open-
ing for engaging in agricultural or other
pursuits.

Reports received from immigration
agents, correspondence had by people
with real estate men and information
concerning the amount of inquiry for the
dates at ticket offices throughout the ter-
ritory all goes to show that a very large
number of people are waiting for the
dates to take advantage of the oppor-
tunity. The tickets will be sold during
March and April, every day, and will al-
low holders to make stops at points west
of certain division lines adopted by the
different railroads. This is done with a
view of having them become familiar
with the country, and that they may in-
vestigate various localities before decid-
ing which comes most nearly to meet-
ing their desires in the choice of a future
home. The schedule announced is for a
rate of \$25 from St. Paul, Omaha, Kan-
sas City and Missouri River points; \$30
from St. Louis, and \$33 from Chicago.

Last year similar rates were in effect
during the early Spring months, and re-
peated again for a longer period in the
Fall. Thousands of travelers availed
themselves of the chance to migrate to
new homes on the Pacific Slope of the
continent. There was some doubt wheth-
er the rates would again be made for this
year, but the railroads seem to have been
entirely satisfied with the results obtained
and glad to renew them.

In the opinion of passenger agents, the
coming Summer will be a record-breaker
for tourist travel in the Northwestern
States and for Alaska, river and Coast
excursion business. Advances of extensive
bookings for the San Francisco conclave
of the Knights Templar in August have
been made, indicating that a large part
of the traffic will move via Portland and
the Pacific Northwest, in one direction.
Tickets will allow liberal stop-over priv-
ileges, and the chances appear most prom-
ising for more visitors who will stay long
enough to learn something of the coun-
try, the opportunities presented for in-
vestment, and its attractions for resi-
dence.

"The Northern Pacific has a big lot of
passenger business assured for the
Knights Templar conclave next August,"
said General Agent Charlton, "and every
indication is that the tourist travel will
be the largest that we have had. Aside
from the attractions of a big gathering,
I look for a great deal of travel west
from the St. Louis Exposition. Lots of
people who come from the East to attend
the Louisiana Purchase Exposition will
plan to make it a Summer vacation and
will visit the Pacific Coast."

There is considerable interest manifested
in the St. Louis Fair rates. The details
have not yet been announced. The direct
route rate of \$67.50 allows diversity of
routes going and coming over the most
direct lines. A rate of \$79 permits the
visitor to go or come via Chicago, travel-
ing the opposite direction by the most
direct route. In addition there will be all
sorts of combinations of route, for side
trips or diversification of route, regula-
tions for which will be included in the
details.

It is known there will be but three sell-
ing dates each month, which will be fixed,
presumably, by the initial lines in each
section of the Coast country. It is not
thought this limited selling period will
cause any heavy congestion, since it is
probable that dates will be so chosen that
the volume of travel from the Northern
and Southern Coast territory will arrive
on different days. With St. Louis the
vortex of the flood of traffic, the lines
for a few hundred miles in each direc-
tion will be obliged to handle as much as
the combined trains of a much greater
number of connecting railroads.—Tele-
gram.

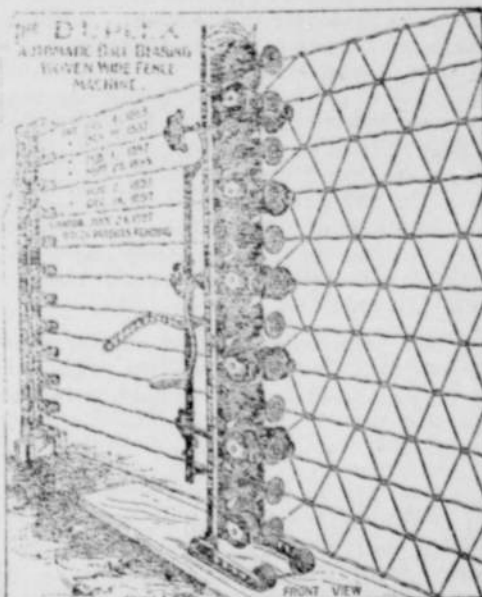
