Board of Trade Meeting.

The February meeting of the Jacksonville board of trade was held Monday evening at the Town hall. Owing to absence out of town of Secretary T. J. Williamson, C. P. Briggs was made secretary pro tem.

The proposition of securing a tiling, terra cotta and pressed brick factory for Jacksonville was considered and Chariman C. W. Conklin, of the advertising committee, reported that in response to an advertisement inserted in Brick, a Chicago clay workers magazine, a man who gave good references and claiming to have capital had opened correspondence with the board in relation to putting in such a factory. Mr. Briggs, of the same committee, reported that he had secured prices on tiling at the Willamette Valley factories and freight rates and other data to submit to tiling men who may wish to investigate the Jacksonville venture. The proposition was fully discussed and the consensus of opinion was that Jacksonville has every advantage that would go to the success of a brick and tiling factory, having large quantities of both common clay and kaolin clay, cheap fuel and good transportation advantages as well as a permanent, increasing market for the product. In compliance with a motion, President Meserve appointed J. Nunan, Jas Cronemiller, Chris Ulrich, Emil Britt and Henry Orth a special committee to secure options on clay lands and to conduct negotiations with parties relative to putting in a clay working plant in Jacksonville.

A report was made by the special road committee, consisting of C. P. Briggs, John S. Orth and Chris Ulrich, stating that they had raised \$510 by subscription and that the town of Jacksonville had appropriated \$200 and Jackson county \$510 making a total of \$1220 that would be available for the improvement of the Jackson creek road and the channel of Jackson creek. As the result of a conference with the county court it had been decided not to let the work by contract. County Commissioner Patterson having consented to supervise the improvements in conjunction with the board of trade committee. On a motion being made to add two more members to the road committee, J. Nunan and C. C. Beckman were appointed by the chair as such additional members.

The proposition of organizing a rural co-operative telephone company for Jacksonville and the adjoining farming districts was brought up and briefly discussed. Henry Kubli of Applegate was present and stated the farmers of that Valley were favorable to joining the telephone company, but owing to the next to impassable condition of the roads and the shortness of the days, he thought it would be a difficult matter to secure a general attendance of farmers at the present time to a meeting to organize a telephone company. In another month when the days are longer and the roads in better condition he thought no difficulty would be had in securing a large attendance of farmers at a meeting to organize a telephone company. The matter was laid over until the next meeting of the board, when it will again be taken up and a date fixed for a meeting of all who are interested in securing a rural telephone service for this locality.

On motion of Mr. Nunan the advertising committee was authorized to get out for immigration purposes 3000 folders, suitable for mailing in envelopes, descriptive of the advantages and resources of Jacksonville and vicinity.
