**The Doctors to Confer.**

Dr. J. W. Robinson and Dr. R. G. Ga'e have each received an invitation signed by Dr. Andrew C. Smith and Dr. Woods Hutchinson, president and secretary respectively of the Oregon State Board of health, to attend a meeting of the county and city health officers and physicians of Oregon to be held in Portland on March 22 and 23. The meeting is for the purpose of discussing proper measures and methods to adopt and pursue in the future to obtain: (1) Prompt and complete reports of contagious diseases; (2) Universal reports of vital statistics; (3) Harmonious co-operation of the laity and profession in checking epidemics of contagious and other dangerous diseases and (4) A conference upon many other points of mutual interest to public health officers and sanitarians.

From the above it appears that the state board of health is going to inaugurate a vigorous campaign against contagious and infectious diseases now so prevalent throughout Oregon and to that end have asked a consultation of the physicians of the state to secure their co-operation in enforcing the state sanitary laws.

**Town Council Proceedings.**

The Jacksonville town council met Tuesday evening with Mayor Britt, Councilmen Orth, Neuber, and Kenney, Recorder Dox, Marshal W. G. Kenney, Street Commissioner Dunford present. Chairman Kenney of the street committee reported that as yet they had been unable to secure cottonwood trees for planting along the breakwater. The party that the committee had contracted with for the trees was unable to fill the order on account of high water in Rogue river overflowing the lowlands from which he expected to procure the trees. The committee had made a contract with other parties and the 275 trees would be had in a short time.

Liquor license granted to Geo. E. Neuber, on payment of \$200, for period of six months.

An order was made to refund to Prof. Washburn \$4.00, the amount of license paid by the High School for show license for Fisk Jubilee Singers concert.

Canvass of votes cast at town election held Tuesday, March 1, for town officers was made and Emil Britt, J. N. Nunan, J. S. Orth, Theo. Cameron, and J. H. Huffer, Sr., were declared elected trustees, Henry Dox, recorder, Jas. M. Cronemiller, treasurer; W. G. Kenney, marshal and Henry Wendt, street commissioner.

A bill of \$7. 80 of the Jacksonville Gas Company was continued as it was desired to have the bill itemized so that the amount could be known that applied on the repair of the street lamp wrecked by Hamilton & Cox's runaway team.

No bill for street lighting for February was put in by the Gas Company as the book keeper was so excited over the town election that he forgot to make out the statement.

Street Commissioner Chas. Dunford reported that he was having difficulty in getting property owners to repair and improve their sidewalks, some telling him that they would neither fix the sidewalks nor pay the bill if the town had the repairs made. The council ordered the street commissioner to give the derelict property owners one more notice and then if they refused, for him to go ahead and put their sidewalks in good repair and the town would bring suit to collect the amount due from the delinquents.

At the present moment, when the shooting of the American seaman Johnson, of the Yankee, the assault on the American consulate at Samana, in Santo Domingo, and the firing on the Clyde line steamer New York by the insurgents, necessitating the bombardment by United States cruisers, are calling forth indignation and suggesting the armed intervention of the United States in the tumult in that island, Mr. Charles S. Solomon's descriptive study of Santo Domingo (in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for March) cannot fail to be interesting, especially as the present outbreak, as well as former revolutions, are explained by the nature of the country and the people. The other half of the island, Haiti, has just celebrated the one-hundredth anniversary of the winning of its independence from France by that negro hero, Toussaint L'Ouverture. Mr. Francis Trevelyan Miller sums up this country of independence, with characterizations of Haitian rulers.

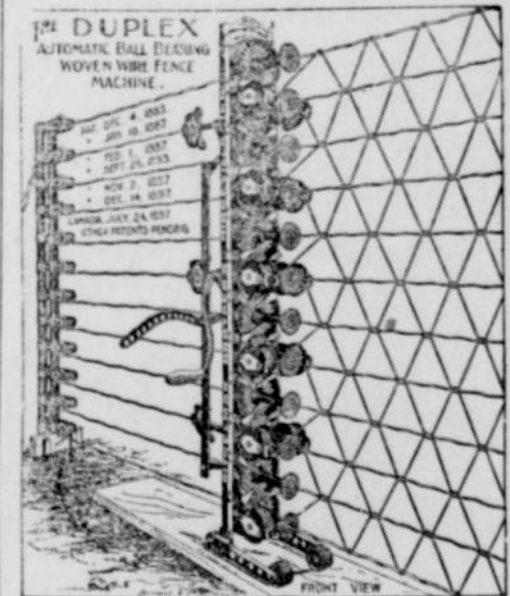
