A Serious Matter If True.

It has now developed that a syndicate controlling almost unlimited resources has been formed, and are sending out agents and advertisements all over the world, for girls for the world's fair at St. Louis. The object is to establish an immense dem-monde district, where a great traffic in girls and their virtue may be carried on. In other words, an immense crib district, such as we have in Los Angeles, where all kinds of lewdness and vice may hold high carnival. Will the people submit to it?—California Voice.

This is one condition of affairs; here is another: A certain syndicate, possibly the same one referred to above, has entered into a contract with the world's fair commissioners under which it is granted the privilege of erecting certain buildings near the entrance to the exposition grounds. These buildings are now in progress of erection. They are large massive structures and are to all outward appearance hotels, lodging houses and similar places for the entertainment conditions of the contract. In order to secure these concessions the syndicate agrees first, to pay the world's fair commission a stipulated sum of money; second, to provide 25,000 innocent girls to be used for the gratification of the brutal passion of the devils in human form who are capable of taking advantage of such a condition! Note the adjective, innocent girls. How are innocent girls to be obtained? There can be but one way. It means that they are to be kidnapped, and these buildings are being constructed and arranged with that special purpose in view.

These facts have been published and hinted at but what is being done? The world held its breath in horror when the news of the awful disaster in the Chicago theater was flashed around the globe, but calmly contemplates the fact that 25,000 pure girls are to be torn from their homes, outraged, ruined, lost, body and soul. Butter Without Hairs or Dirt in It.

The Salem correspondent of the Oregonian makes mention of a new process for straining and purifying milk that is employed by a dairyman in that locality, that appears to have merit to it and to be worthy of trial by other dairymen. The following is what was said of the process: Clyda Bonney who operates the M. L. Jones farm, near Brooks, has adopted a plan which enables him to secure a price for his milk 10 cents per hundred higher than that paid to his neighbors, and even a better price relatively may be secured. He filters his milk before it goes into the pail, and thereby makes it very noticeably in both taste and keeping qualities. Each milk pail has a strainer over the top. The strainer consists of two sheets of gauze, with a layer of absorbent cotton between them. As the milk comes from the cow it passes through this filter and all impurities are removed. Foul substances that would otherwise drop into the pail while milking are thus kept out.

Tests have shown that the milk will keep twice as long as that strained after milking in the ordinary way. The use of the filter takes no extra time and no extra expense worth mentioning. The proprietors of the Commercial Creamery express the hope that other farmers will adopt a similar method; for it tends to improve the creamery product and build up a good reputation for Oregon dairies. This method they believe would be particularly beneficial in dairies furnishing milk to consumers in this city.

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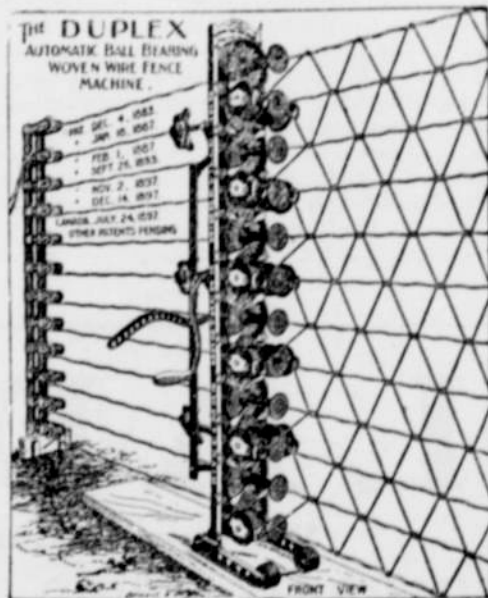
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
