The lack of capital is not the greatest misfortune that may befall a town. McMinnville probably has five times the amount of actual money Newberg can boast of and yet in the race that is being made for active, energetic business Newberg is throwing dust in the eyes of our neighbors every day in the week, as a comparison of the manufacturing interests of the two towns will show. It is said by residents of the county seat that too much of their money is laid away for the anticipated "rainy day," for the best interests of the present generation, while in Newberg every dollar is invested in some enterprise that gives somebody something to do. It is easy to see that an abundance of dead capital may be more of a hindrance in the way of an aspiring town than a partial lack of live capital.

central committeeman for Sams Valley precinct and a probable candidate for representative.

Deputy Sheriff Oris Crawford denies that he is a party to the reported trade whereby he is to step aside in the contest for the nomination for recorder in the Democratic convention in favor of M. Purdin, of Medford. But he makes no statement as to whether he will be a candidate or not.

Not wishing to antagonize the interests of his friend and employer, Deputy County Treasurer Robert Dow will not permit his name to come before the Democratic convention as an opposing candidate to the renomination of County Treasurer D. H. Miller.

Marshal T. J. Kenny of Jacksonville is one of the latest aspirants for political honors. Mr. Kenny's plans are far reaching and ambitious for he wants to be one of the delegates from Jacksonville to the convention in Ashland, that is to select the delegates from Jackson county to the congressional convention at Salem and he insists on being one of the county delegates to Salem. Then he has another scheme that would do credit to a Portland politician and that is for him to have the backing of the delegation from Jacksonville to the county convention at Gold Hill in a scheme to make himself solid with the powers that he can place them under obligations to him to give him the sheriff's nomination on the Republican ticket two years hence the inference being that a weak man be put up this campaign who would be so badly defeated by the Democratic candidate that he would not dare try for the contest in the next campaign.

Joseph Hammersly has entered the lists as an aspirant for the nomination for county judge on the Republican ticket. Mr. Hammersly is a young man of Gold Hill admitted to the bar last year, and

he proposes to make a lively contest for coveted honor.

R. G. Smith, an attorney of Grants Pass, has announced himself as a candidate for circuit judge on the Democratic ticket but leading democrats do not look upon his aspiration with favor as they are not sure of his democracy, for he was formerly a Republican and then joined the Socialists and it is said that he admits that he is with the Democratic party now for the reason that a large faction of that party favors the principles of the Socialists and he expects to be able to do more for Socialism by allying himself with the Democrats than to stay with the Socialists.

He is required to make two round trips a week leaving Jacksonville Mondays and Fridays and returning Tuesdays and Saturdays, which is the same service as heretofore had on that route and his pay will be the same as that of John Wilson former carrier. Mr. Silva will at once make up his bond and forward it to Washington and it will probably be the first of April before he will begin carrying the mail. Should the passenger and freight traffic warrant it he will make three trips a week during the summer months.
