

LOCAL NOTES.

Charlie Dunford has been off duty this week from driving his father's express wagon, by an attack of grippe, but he is rallying and expects to resume his work next week. As Mr. Dunford could not do all the draying and delivering with one team, his other son, Oscar, has been taking a vacation from school this week while driving the express wagon.

John Spiker, who spent last summer in this section, he having some fine claims in the Upper Applegate copper district, and who went last fall to Colorado to spend the winter with relations at Boulder, writes to friends here that he expects to be back to Jacksonville early in April and that he will probably make Southern Oregon his home hereafter as the climate of no other section suits him so well as that of this Valley.

The Jackson County Lumber Company started up their mill Monday and will run this week. The mill will not be run again until the roads dry up so logs can be hauled from the woods. The company has had a force of men yarding out all winter and they now have a large quantity of logs on the rollways ready to haul to the mill. The company expects by the 1st of April to put on a full crew in both the mill and the woods and to run their mill to its full capacity this summer.

William Murphy went off duty at the postoffice Monday and he is at home this week with a severe attack of mumps. Richard Donnegan is assisting Postmaster Miller during the absence of Mr. Murphy and so obliging and smiling is he while doing duty at the general delivery window that the young ladies come early and often for their mail, but their disappointment at not receiving a letter each trip is completely effaced by one of Dick's bright smiles and they depart as happy as a lark on a May morning.

The contact for carrying the morning mail between Medford and Jacksonville has been awarded to Frank Bellinger. He is to make seven trips each week and is to leave Medford each morning not later than 6:30 o'clock. His bid, which was the lowest of several including the local railroad company's which was for \$365, was for \$359.95 a year, which is a little less than a dollar a trip, but he will get passenger and parcel traffic without doubt to bring his pay up to profitable figure. The inauguration of this service, which is to begin next Monday, March 21, will give free rural delivery for the residents along the route who put up the regulation mail boxes. This will be a convenience that the residents along the route will greatly appreciate and it will add much to the advantages of the Jacksonville-Medford boulevard as a residence district. Mr. Bellinger is allowed an hour and a half in which to make the trip but he will probably make it in an hour or less, which will get the mail in Jacksonville at 7:30 a. m. This enables connections to be made with the Upper Applegate stage, which leaves at 8 o'clock, but not with the stage for Lower Applegate as that leaves at 7 o'clock, but it is probable that when the roads dry up and Mr. Wendt can make better time with the Lower Applegate stage that arrangements will be made whereby he will delay his departure until the arrival of the Medford stage. This additional mail service will give Jacksonville mail half a day earlier than under the present arrangement and give the six Applegate post-offices the mail 24 hours earlier than under the present schedule.

The Road Problem.

EDITOR SENTINEL.—As seen by one who has been somewhat of an observer of the roads good and bad, in other countries, who is frank to say, that he has never seen so much of bad roads where good material for making good roads was so plentiful. It is a settled fact in my mind since observing the grade thrown up through the Bursell Ranch on the road south west of Central Point that there is many miles of public highway in Jackson County, that could be made into perfect boulevards, by simply grading and using a modern steam road roller, during the process of grading. Keeping the granite thoroughly packed from start to finish.

Then, with a good screen to run the gravel and tailings through, of which there is untold quantities lying within a very short haul of many more miles of roads in the county, and in many instances, right along the roadside, where only for the benefit is derived from running it over a screen and getting the coarse in the bottom of the road where it will be of most service and the fine screenings on top to avoid the cobble stone effect, it could be scooped right onto the grade with drag scoops. In many countries abutting property owners, under similar conditions, would build their own boulevard and keep it in repair. The writer has sold many yards of gravel at from 15 to 25 cents per yard to be hauled from 1 to 10 miles, for the purpose of building and repairing turnpikes, and would suppose judging from present conditions in Jackson County, that if material for road building was scarce here, the miles of turnpike or graveled road would be but few; but having seen good roads gradually thread a country under the unfavorable conditions mentioned, feels sure that with the natural advantages which Jackson county affords for good roads will soon force themselves upon the people, so that it may be noted for its fine drives, along with its fine orchards, which should go hand in hand. Let us all aid the Sentinel in its good roads argument until good roads we have.
