W. S. Breeding, a rancher and miner of Woodville vicinity, was in Jacksonville Monday on business at the court house.

The Williams creek stage started on its new time schedule Tuesday, March 15th. It will from now on leave Grants Pass at 7 a. m. instead of 1 p. m. and leaves Williams at 1 p. m. just reversing the order of stage run.—Oregon Mining Journal.

Frank Hull, a well known photographer of Medford will open a gallery in Jacksonville about April 1st. Mr. Hull is a hustler, a good photographer and should do a good business in Jacksonville. Mr. Hull who has married since he was in Jacksonville last summer will have his wife with him.

As a part of the mining exhibit that the Sentinel is getting up, a rocker, pan shovel and pick are wanted. They should be veterans and should show the hard service of many a prospecting trip. These old relics will add much to the interest of the exhibit to Eastern people visiting Jacksonville, and the Sentinel will appreciate the favor if its mining friends can send in the old tools, the like of which has made both millionaires and paupers.

John Frazier, a young man from Sullivan county, Missouri, arrived in Jacksonville Tuesday on his way to Applegate, where he will visit at the homes of M. D. Sturgis and Isaac McIntyre, relatives of his. Mr. Frazier may locate in this county.

The rural telephone having pretty well covered the Willamette Valley with a net work of wires is working south and the first local line in the Umpqua Valley is soon to be in operation, it being from Drain to Gardiner. A second rural line is to be established, the farmers in the vicinity of Dixonville, Douglas county, having organized a co-operative company and will soon begin the installation of their telephone system.

Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion for the benefit of the assessors of the state that timber land claims become taxable when the receipt for the purchase money is issued by the government. He has also rendered an opinion that farm or other lands owned by the state are not taxable.

Rev. and Mrs. J. Merley have changed their place of abode from Medford to Central Point where they have purchased the fine home and 10-acre tract of land belonging to J. M. Gay on the Jacksonville road west of Central Point. Rev. Merley will have charge of the Baptist church in Central Point and in the duties of his pastoral duties he will devote his time to the growing of small fruits, he intending to plant the greater part of his land to strawberries and other small fruits.

John F. Spencer, a fruit grower of Grand Junction, near Glenwood Springs, Colorado, has produced a seedless apple. The new fruit very much resembles the seedless orange in that the meat is solid and there is a slightly hard substance in the navel end. The trees have no blossoms. Spencer says he began experimenting with the apple shortly after the seedless orange appeared. He reasoned that if it was possible to destroy germination in the orange it was possible in the apple. He originally produced five trees that would bear seedless apples, and then experimented to see if he could make the buds reproduce others. In this he succeeded and secured forty additional trees. From these he has budded 2,000 more. Spencer claims that with the seedless apple many diseases due to the laying of eggs by moths in the apple blossoms will be avoided.

Capt. B. F. Devinnèy, of Pendleton, Deputy Grand Master Workmen for Oregon of the Ancient Order United Workmen, has been in Jacksonville since Tuesday soliciting members for his order. This Friday evening he will meet with the local lodge and give a short address to the members. Capt. Devinnèy is a pleasant appearing gentleman, an old soldier having served four and one-half years in the Civil War in the Third, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Illinois Infantry. He was one of the first members of the Workmen, his certificate being No. 253. Capt. Devinnèy was personally acquainted with Father J. J. Upchurch, the founder of the order, he organizing the first lodge at Meadville, Pa., where he resided and was master mechanic in the railroad

machine shop at that place, on October 27 1868. The first lodge was made up of 14 members, fellow workmen in the shops with Mr. Upchurch, thus the name of the order. The order now has nearly 475,000 members in the United States. The Workmen have 12,000 members in Oregon and took in 421 new members the past year.
