

Jackson County Republican Convention

A Republican county convention for Jackson county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet at Ashland, Saturday, April 9, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing twelve delegates to attend the Republican Congressional Convention for the First district to meet at Salem, April 13th, and twelve delegates to attend the Republican State Convention to meet at Portland, April 14th.

It is recommended that primaries be held in the several precincts at the usual polling places on Saturday, April 2, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to said county convention which will consist of 133 members, apportioned to the several precincts as follows:

The same being two delegates at large for each precinct and one for each 25 votes or major fraction thereof cast therein for Hon. W. J. Furnish for governor in 1902, and two for the new precinct of North Jacksonville.

A convention to nominate candidates for the several county offices to be filled at the June election and to select members of the Republican county central committee for the ensuing two years will be held at Gold Hill, Friday, May 6, 1904, at 10 o'clock a. m., with the same apportionment of delegates thereto from the various precincts as above, with precinct primaries on April 30th. It is the sense of the County Committee that in the discretion of precinct committeemen one primary meeting may be called to elect delegates to both conventions to be held on the first primary day mentioned, viz, April 2d.

It is also the sense of the county committee that proxies in said convention be confined to residents of the precincts they represent.

Democratic County Convention.

A Democratic Convention for Jackson county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet at Wilson's Opera House, in Medford, Saturday, April 16, 1904, at 11 o'clock a. m. of said day to select delegates to the Democratic State Convention to be held at Portland, April 19, 1904, and to nominate candidates for the legislative and county officers to be voted for at the ensuing June election. Primaries to select delegates to said county convention will be held in each precinct (as same were existing at the time of holding the last general election held in Oregon, at the polling places in the respective precincts as then existed,) on Saturday, April 9, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m. All voters who affiliate with the Democratic party are requested to attend and participate in said primaries. Delegates to the county convention will be apportioned as follows: One delegate for each 25 votes cast for George E. Chamberlain for governor in 1902 and one delegate for each major fraction of 25 votes so cast; but each precinct to be entitled to at least one delegate. The precincts as named in this apportionment are supposed to conform to the boundaries of said precincts existing in 1902. Delegates holding proxies to the county convention must be residents of the precincts to which the proxies pertain.

Board of Trade Meeting.

A special meeting of the board of trade was held Monday evening and despite the fact that there were other events in town there was an attendance of about twenty-five. After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read by Secretary Williamson, the secretary read an answer to the board of trade's advertisement from an Ohio tile and brick manufacturer, who was desirous of coming West and who wished information as to the possibilities of starting a factory in Jacksonville. The letter was referred to the special committee having the tile proposition in hand. The secretary also read a communication from A. G. Hillen, representing the Mining Record, of Chicago, proposing an advertising proposition to embrace a write-up of the mining interests of this section. A short discussion of the proposition was had, during which Mr. Hillen more fully presented the merits of his paper, but as the board has been doing considerable advertising, it was decided to not take up added responsibilities at present.

The principal object of the meeting was to consider ways and means of bettering the hotel accommodations for Jacksonville. After a brief discussion, in which it was indicated that the need of better hotel accommodations was an imperative necessity to Jacksonville's prosperity, a motion was carried that a committee of three, of which J. Nunan should be chairman, should be appointed by the president to take up the hotel proposition and to secure the organization of a company to build a new hotel or buy the U. S. hotel property and refit it into a modern hotel. As such committee the president appointed J. Nunan, T. J. Kenney and T. J. Williamson.

The question of a change in the location of the Jackson creek road was brought up and after a discussion of the merits of various routes it was decided to adopt the route proposed by the road committee and the committee was authorized to go ahead with their petition and have the new route legalized which follows the present line of travel, the old survey being north of the Neuber-Wendt road, along the line of the J. N. T. Miller land.

President Meserve announced that he had called no meeting for the purpose of organizing a rural telephone company as the bad condition of the roads prevented a general gathering of the farmers during the past month and now spring work was begun they did not have time to attend. A member-hip pledge will be gotten up and circulated, and when a sufficient number of signatures have been secured a meeting will be called for the purpose of organizing the company.

Mr. J. L. Hammersly, postmaster and an attorney of Gold Hill, was present and on invitation of the president gave a short address in which he spoke of the many helps that a board of trade was to a town, and of the good reports that he had frequently heard of the work that the Jacksonville board of trade was doing for the town and adjoining county. He was sure that had Jacksonville had a board of trade twenty years ago, the town would not have lost the railroad and there would have been no Medford. He also said that Gold Hill was now without a board of trade, their board having been killed off by the inexperience and the expensive ways of the man at the head of it, but that they hoped to organize another this year.
