LOCAL NOTES.

Porcelain nest eggs for all the hens in Jackson county at Nunan-Taylor Company.

E. D. Briggs, one of Ashland's well-known attorneys, was in Jacksonville Monday looking after legal matters in the Circuit Court.

Ex-district attorney, C. B. Watson, of Ashland, was in Jacksonville, Monday on business in the Circuit Court before Judge Hanna.

H. C. Maury was in town Tuesday with a load of barley which he had ground for feed at Ulrich's mill. Mr. Maury has 10 acres to vegetables and small fruits, and also an orchard of large fruits and quite an acreage to grain and grass. Mr. Maury will make his first trip to Jacksonville this Saturday with a load of vegetables, which is a later date than for years, the cold, backward spring retarding the growth of all garden truck until it is nearly a month later than usual.

A. C. Wilson, who has a three acre tract of rich land just out of town on the Medford road, is making it an attractive place, and a comfortable home for himself and Mrs. Wilson. To keep up with the spirit of improvement, he is now replacing the old fence with a neat picket fence.

Judge Chas. Prim and George Neuber left Monday for their country lodge at Squaw Lake, they going to that famous fishing and hunting resort by the way of the new \$7,000 county road up the Apple-gate, which is now in fine condition for travel. Fishing is said to be good now in the tributaries to the Upper Applegate, and the Judge and Mr. Neuber will doubtless be able to bring home a fine string of fish.

Dr. Bowersox has had a long distance telephone placed in his residence thus making it convenient for persons to call him readily day or night.

L. B. Warner, the hustling fruit tree dealer of Medford, was in Jacksonville and vicinity last Monday, looking up trade prospects for the coming planting season this fall. Mr. Warner stated that he had sold more trees this past season than in any year since he has been in the nursery business in the Rogue River valley, and he expects to do better this season as the indications are that there will be a great increase over previous years in the acreage planted to fruit trees and to small fruits and berries.

E. E. Gore, of the firm of Wortman & Gore, the well-known stock buyers of Medford, was in Jacksonville on Monday. Mr. Gore reports that range feed, though later than usual, is fine and that stock are doing finely. As to price prospects, Mr. Gore thinks, that there will be an advance in the price of fat stock, but he expects no big raise as there has been a large number of both cattle and sheep held over, that would have been placed on the market last fall and winter had prices not taken a tumble, and this added supply will tend to hold prices in check. But the day for cheap stock is past for there are no more big ranges to be developed, and the small farmer cannot raise cheap stock on high priced land.

The Board of Trade held a meeting Monday evening, to consider a proposition from the farmers residing on the Jacksonville-Willow Springs road to take up the improvement of that road. These farmers have raised \$300 toward the fund for the improvement of their road, and the board decided to have Jacksonville contribute \$100 to the fund, the business men \$50, and the town \$50. A larger sum would have been given, but Jacksonville has given very liberally lately toward the improvement of the Jackson Creek road, and to several other public enterprises thus making it necessary to slow up for a time on contributions. The county court has agreed with road supervisor Wm. Penniger and J. M. Hurley, who are canvassing funds for the proposed road improvement that the county would put up dollar for dollar, which now gives them \$800, an amount large enough to grade and drain the roadway and to gravel the worst sections. Gravel will be taken from Jackson Creek for the first section out from town, and for the sections beyond both gravel and rotten granite is accessible with but short hauls. This Willow Springs road is one of the most important of the eight roads that center in Jacksonville, and it being made readily passable for vehicles at all seasons of the year will be a profitable investment to both Jacksonville and the large farming community along the road. The Board of Trade committee to raise the \$100 pledged by the board consists of J. Nunan, Theo. Cameron and W. H. Miller.
