Nickell the trimmer, who runs the Medford Southern Oregonian with Republican proclivities, and the Medford Democratic Times with Democratic leanings, has made a scurrilous attack upon Judge Hanna because the Republicans, of Jackson county, at their convention in Ashland, saw fit to pass a resolution by a unanimous vote endorsing the Judge as their candidate for circuit judge at the ensuing election. In placing Judge Hanna upon their ticket the Republicans asked no pledge of party fealty from him, nor did they ask as to his past party affiliations; it was enough that they knew that he was an honest, conscientious man, a judge whose legal attainments make him the peer of any other man on the Oregon bench, and that he is ever mindful of the interests of the taxpayers and holds the expenses of his court down to the lowest limit consistent with justice to litigants. The nomination came to Judge Hanna unsought by him as did the nominations on the Democratic ticket years ago, and he never asked a Democrat to vote for him, as he now has made no request for Republican support. As to the date of Judge Hanna's admission to the Republican party Mr. Nickell should plead no ignorance to that for it took place at the time that Nickell and other Populists forced a resolution through the Democratic central committee prohibiting all Democrats from taking part in the party primaries who did not vote for Bryan at the election in 1896 and endorse the Populist doctrines that were in the Democratic platform of that campaign. As to Judge Hanna "having his ear to the ground and willing to take his chances with the party which can furnish him the most votes" that is not proven by the facts, for when the Judge left the Democratic-Populist party it was in control of Jackson county by a big majority and he took his chances as an independent candidate and was re-elected by one of the most flattering votes ever given a candidate in this judicial district. The animus of Nickell's attack upon Judge Hanna is that the Judge refused to permit Nickell to control all of the legal notices and printing that pertain to the circuit court and to work his graft in the brazen manner for which he has been noted for years past whenever opportunity offered. Judge Hanna will again be re-elected circuit judge and by a vote so large that the Nickell opposition will be lost in the oblivion of ignominious defeat.

The SENTINEL made mention some time since, that the Republican campaign in Jackson county would be carried on as a captains' fight, and that the higher officers would exercise no command in the local fight against the Democratic and Socialist forces. That predictions looked true at the time, but recent events has brought about a new disposi-

tion in the personal of the commanders of the Jackson county Republican forces. As Admiral Ankeny has gubernatorial aspirations and Commodore Vawter congressional hopes and Commodore Carter state treasurer expectations it was presumed that these three powerful leaders would keep out of local entanglements. But Commodore Carter was not content to let well enough alone, and started in to assume sole control of the campaign for naming delegates to the congressional convention, and to put up a delegation for Harris in opposition to the Hermann delegation that was being brought forward by Captains Keene, Kubli and Gore and Lieutenant commanders Heard, Kenney and Cook. The result being that in the clash of authority in the Ashland action the indiscrete Commodore was deprived of his command and came so near being relegated to the ranks that there is little likelihood of his getting a Jackson county delegation two years hence to push his treasurer ship candidacy in the state convention, or to get a nomination on the legislative ticket, and Commodore Carter owes his rescue from utter annihilation to the magnanimity and party patriotism of Commodore Vawter for it was at Mr. Vawter's earnest request the opposition permitted Mr. Carter to name himself as a candidate to the state convention that he might carry out his cherished plans of getting to be a delegate to the National Republican convention in Chicago. And Mr. Vawter did this, notwithstanding the fact that it was only last year at the congressional convention held in Medford, that Mr. Carter did him a gross injustice. Mr. Vawter was a candidate for congress and an unwritten law of politicians is that a candidate to a congressional or state convention, who has the unanimous support of his county convention, is allowed to name the men whom he desires on his delegation. Mr. Vawter had selected Henry Kubli as one of his delegates, but Mr. Carter for a personal grievance which he had against Mr. Kubli raised such strong objections that he was able to defeat Mr. Kubli, and to himself name the delegate who was to be on Mr. Vawter's delegation. Mr. Vawter would have been justified in retaliating upon Mr. Carter in Saturday's convention but he was more manly and having the interest of his party at heart did his full part to end the strife rather than continue it.

The Democratic county convention will meet this Saturday at Medford in Wilson's opera house at 10 a. m. It promises to be a convention where in brotherly love and harmony will rule as is nearly always the case where the minority party is in control. It is certain that almost every nomination will be acclamation and the following likely will be the personnel of the ticket: Representatives, John D. Olwell, Central Point, L. L. Mulet, of Ashland; County Judge, Chas. Prim, Jacksonville; Commissioner J. J. Hauck, Gold Hill; Clerk, John, S. Ord, Jacksonville; Sheriff, Joseph Rader Big Butte; Recorder, Robert Dow, Medford; Treasurer D. H. Miller Medford; Assessor, Fred Furry, Phoenix; School Superintendent, Gus Samuels, Griffin Creek; Surveyor, Frank Roundtree, Jacksonville; Coroner Dr. H. P. Hargrave, Medford. For district judicial officers the convention will endorse Evan A. Reams, of Jacksonville, for district attorney and Col. R. V. Drake, of Klamath Falls, for circuit judge for Klamath and Lake counties. For this section of the district embracing Jackson and Josephine counties, ex Judge J. R. Neil, of Jacksonville will be asked to allow his name to go on to fill out the ticket the Democrats having no expectation of electing him against Judge Hanna on the Republican ticket. Some of the Democrats favor endorsing Judge Hanna while others think it is best to leave their ticket blank and those wishing to vote for Judge Hanna can write in his name. There may be one or two changes in the above list of candidates for Jason Hartman of Roxy has been mentioned for commissioner, and E. Purdin, of Medford may seek the nomination for recorder. Deputy Sheriff Oris Crawford who ran on the Democratic ticket for recorder two years ago will not be a candidate, but will remain in Sheriff Rader's office, where he has proved to be a most accommodating and efficient deputy. Report has it that Mr. Crawford will be a candidate two years hence for sheriff. Jackson county is entitled to 10 delegates to the state Democratic convention, which meets in Portland on next Tuesday. Those mentioned so far for the honor are L. L. Mulet and W. E. Phipps, Ashland, J. D. Olwell, Central Point, C. L. Reames Jacksonville, J. A. Whitman, Dr. E. B. Pickel and Chas. Nickell, Medford, J. J. Hauck, Gold Hill. It is said that Dr. E. B. Pickel will be made a pre-

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sidental elector and John D. Olwell of Medford a delegate to the National Democratic convention in St. Louis though Mr. Mulet is said to wish to go to St. Louis and does not desire the nomination for representative.

Jacksonville fared well at the Ashland convention. On committees: Dr. Robinson had a place on the committee on resolutions, Emil Britt was on the committee on order of business. Henry Dox was one of the tellers. For delegates to the state and congressional conventions, four were allotted to Jacksonville, while Medford got five. Ashland three and Gold Hill one. The Jacksonville delegates were: Hon. Theo. Cameron and Emil Britt to the state convention, and Dr. Robinson and W. G. Kenney to the congressional convention.

The Democratic primary for Jacksonville was held Saturday afternoon in the Town hall and there were about 50 of the faithful present, which was a better attendance than the Republicans had at their primary the previous Saturday. Jas. A. Wilson was made chairman and John Beavenue secretary. Clarence Reames and Frank Bybee were chosen without opposition as delegates to the county convention.

Only two of the Jacksonville delegates to the congressional and state convention were able to go. Dr. Robinson was detained at home by professional duties and Emil Britt has been so delayed by the wet weather this spring in pruning and cultivating his large vineyard that he could not leave his work. Ex-Senator Theo. Cameron who is a delegate to the state convention took with him the proxy of Dr. Robinson for the congressional convention, and W. G. Kenney, who is a delegate to the congressional convention, had the proxy of Mr. Britt for the state convention, thus giving Jacksonville its two delegates in each convention. Mr. Cameron, Mr. Kenney and Henry Kubli of Applegate who is 1 delegate to the congressional convention and who holds the proxy to the state convention of A. L. Kromling, of Rock Point, left for Salem Tuesday evening to be in attendance at the congressional convention which met Wednesday, after which they will go to Portland to the state convention Thursday. At Medford they were joined by Hon. W. I. Vawter, Dr. J. M. Keene, D. T. Lawton, I. L. Hamilton, W. H. Gore and J. D. Heard. Hon. H. E. Ankney, who is also a delegate went north Sunday. Gus Newbury accompanied the delegates to be present at the state convention to look after his interests as a candidate for district attorney.

H. Von der Hellen of Wellen, was a county seat visitor Monday. Mr. Von der Hellen declares that he is in no wise a candidate for county judge, his preference being J. W. Merritt of Central Point. Neither is he a candidate for any other office. As he is being mentioned by many prominent Republicans for a place on their ticket as one of the representatives, Mr. Von der Hellen stated, that he is not a candidate for that honor, though he admitted in an interview, that if the convention gave him the nomination without a contest being made, that he would accept it and go into the campaign to do his full part to bring success to the entire ticket.

Judge Hanna will go to Grants Pass Sunday evening and Monday morning he will convene the April term of circuit court for Josephine county. The session will probably last about two weeks.
